NEW YORK, Jan. 13.-When the rules mittee of the National and American Leagues meet at Pittsburg on Jan. 14,

"The replies show that the umpires have practically little friction with the players actually engaged in the game, and that the present trouble is caused by the coachers and the players on the benches. The rules against kicking on the ball field are clearly drawn and can be rigidly enforced. There are ironclad rules governing the coachers, too, but in looking over the code I find that there is nothing to prevent the misconduct of players on the


