Mutual disabilities are said to be responsible for this and The Sun claims to be using the phrase of the high Presbyterian aforesaid when it calls this unemployed class "tramp clergymen." The reasons for this state of affairs are stated to be that the possession of a family is a serious inconvenience to a minister in filling the calls from many districts, and in other places leads him to humiliate himself in order to hold his position. The earning of a good livelihood becomes paramount to him rather than the service to which he is dedicated. The Sun is, therefore, impelled to ask these questions: First, is not this prevalent dissatisfaction with ministers due to declining religious faith in either the churches or the preachers? Secondly, is it not better for a minister to remain unmarried? With Presbyterian theological seminaries denying the infallibility of the Bible, and Congregational ministers like Dr. Lyman Abbott preaching that Biblical miracles are not believable because they conflict with natural laws, how can the faith of the churches be kept warm and vital?
