Special to The Toronto World. LONDON, April 3.—The prolonged lull on the western front was unbroken yesterday. The official German report mentions three small attacks by French and Belgian forces, which were repulsed.

Bulgarian Troops Occupy Serbian Border Territory Frontier Patrols Were Overwhelmed According to Official Despatch From Nish.

PARIS, April 3, 1.15 p.m.—Hostilities between Serbian troops and Bulgarian irregulars have broken out along the border. An official statement issued at Nish, Serbia, as forwarded to the Havas Agency says that the Bulgarians overwhelmed the Serbian frontier patrols and occupied Serbian territory.

Special to The Toronto World. LONDON, April 3.—An official despatch from Ghevelin, Serbia, to Salonika, forwarded to the Havas Agency, confirms the statement that Bulgarian bands crossed the Serbian border.

PHILADELPHIA, April 3.—The storm which struck the middle Atlantic states, July today became a blizzard, worse than any storm of the past winter in this section. Accompanied by a high wind, the snow at first melted as it fell, but later it stuck and at 2 p.m. more than six inches was on the ground.
