Dr. Magill, of Halifax, will be the speaker.

LOOK INTO THE FUTURE

Pacific Ocean Has Grown in Importance.

The Pacific Ocean is daily growing in importance, says a United States exchange, and somehow the going of the United States fleet from the Atlantic to the Pacific seems to be the moving out of the little old pioneer house into a bigger and better one.
It is something more than a mere practice cruise that is being carried on by the fleet, steaming down today along the South American coast, is headed for Magellan's Straits and the great sea off to the westward.
It means that henceforth, in a constantly increasing degree, the world's thoughts and activities will centre in the Pacific. Europe, which is older than the United States, and which practiced world politics long before that term became the cant of the street, realizes the ultimate consequences of the trip of the American squadron far more vividly than we do.
In its large relations the trip of Admiral Evans' ships is discussed more fully and much more intelligently by the leading London, Paris, Berlin and St. Petersburg newspapers than it is by the American press. Being a little farther away from the scene than we are, Europe is better able to throw this exploit into its proper perspective, and to forecast the story about it which history will tell. It was St. Petersburg, who first gauged the importance of the present demonstration. Seven or eight months ago, when the trip was first projected, and when many of our own papers opposed it, and when still more of them doubted that it would ever take place, The Novoe Vremya, the best-known and ablest paper printed in Russia's capital, foretold the advent of a new era which would begin when the Atlantic fleet, leaving the eastern sea and its associations and interests behind it, steamed out into the Pacific.
