

A few workers like Henry Sherrard mean a great deal to a regatta or ganization. Those who don't work should keep off the firing line. Space is worth more than punk.

Something should be done to make swimming contests more popular. In the 100 and 220 yard championships at the regatta on Friday there was a mere handful of contestants; in fact, the first race had to be postponed until there were a sufficient number of entries to make it worth while holding the event. More swimming contests would go a long way to inducing more people to acquire proficiency in the art, and that lessens the chance of drowning accidents.

Aquatic sports form too large a part of Toronto's life to be niggardly dealt with. Three hundred and fifty dollars does not go far in providing prizes for a big regatta. Surely the city fathers might forego one of their junketing trips and make the annual contribution an even \$500, or perhaps go better! Aquatic sports, above all others, help to maintain the splendid standard of amateurism, and in these days of ultra-commercialism a little money spent in this direction will yield good dividends.
