OPENING SERVICE AT ST. BARNABAS' CHURCH

Bishop of Toronto Conducts First Service in New Edifice of the Chester Congregation.

The first of the opening services of the completed portion of the new St. Barnabas Church, Danforth-avenue, was held Friday night, with a congregation of 200 in attendance. His Lordship the Bishop of Toronto preached and other clergy attending were: Archdeacon Ingles, Canon Dixon, Canon Farncombe, Revs. G. L. Taylor, J. E. Fotheringham, L. Vaughan, D. T. Owen, A. H. Owen, A. H. Brachen, G. Tyler, R. Seaborn and T. Summerhayes. Prayers were read by Rev. J. B. Fotheringham and Archdeacon Ingles.

In bidding the lord bishop and other clergy and laity welcome to the new church, the pastor, Rev. F. P. Bond, spoke feelingly of the loyal efforts of many of the parishioners to carry on the work, which had been beset with many difficulties. These were not yet over, but he knew the spirit of his parishioners and looked forward with fullest confidence for the future.

The sermon of the bishop was an earnest and eloquent appeal to the parish to appreciate their heritage of membership in the old apostolic church and in their new structure, which was God's means and man's need. Of their pastor's need for their support and prayers, he spoke with intense earnestness and for forty minutes held the congregation's closest attention.

The singing by choir and congregation was very heavy. Much credit is due to Choirmaster W. Edmeads and Organist Mrs. Hitchman for the splendid rendition.

The opening services will be continued during December and January, with special preachers. Tomorrow morning the Right Rev. Dr. Reeve, assistant bishop, will preach, and in the evening Rev. Provost Macklem of Trinity College.

The portion of the church now built will seat over 400, but the larger church will eventually hold 1000. The value of the part now completed is \$25,000.

CUSHING QUILTS HIS PLACE TO AVOID FACING CHARGES

Retirement From Alberta Legislature Said To Be Due to Another Member's Program.

EDMONTON, Alta., Dec. 17.—(Special).—The Alberta Legislature adjourned yesterday. Outside the cancellation of the contract with the Alberta Great Waterways, the only sensational feature was the retirement of W. H. Cushing, ex-minister of public works, which was brought about by the series of serious charges preferred against him in the Edmonton Capital.

The paper was placed on the table of the house by James Cornwall, Liberal member for Peace River, since which time the ex-minister has not taken his seat in the legislature. Had the ex-minister returned to the house, it would have been to face direct charges as Cornwall has them already prepared, supplementing those which appeared in the Capital, with a number of others, and was going to ask that a select committee of the house be appointed to investigate.

This, Cushing was anxious to avoid, and great pressure was brought on Cornwall to refrain from making special charges in the house. Cornwall felt it was absurd, and that if Cushing took his seat in the house again, that he would take action. This occurred ten days ago, and Cushing has not sat in the legislature since.

MEXICAN REVOLT RENEWED

Federal Troops Worsted in Battle With Rebels.

EL PASO, Texas, Dec. 17.—Federal Mexican troops were completely overthrown in an engagement lasting several hours at Lajun, a small town near Huesca, on the Mexican Northern and Great Railroad, according to information received by railroad officials here.

At 4:30 o'clock this morning the remainder of the federal troops, numbering 150, surrendered their arms and ammunition, and were allowed to depart in the direction of Chihuahua.

As telegraph wires were cut in many places, no details of the battle can be secured. A telephone wire running north thru the mountains brought the news to the Juarez branch of the Mexico Northwestern that the federal forces were decisively defeated and that the survivors had surrendered. The federal forces were supposed to number over 200 men, and were in command of General Navarro and Berandez.

The fight at Lajun is believed to be a continuation of the battle reported in the vicinity of San Andres Thursday night. An effort was made to-day to run trains over the Mexico Northwestern into Chihuahua, but with what success cannot be earned. The railway officials say that the insurgents are in complete control of the entire region, and that traffic is practically at a standstill.

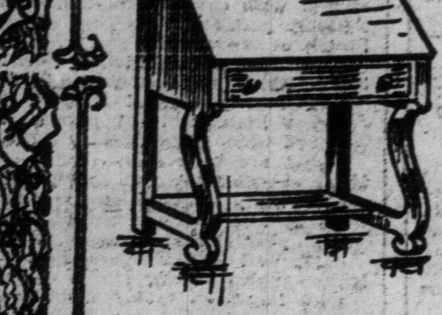
