Salary Reductions

Salaries of baseball players in the American League who were signed at high figures to retain them during the war with the Federal League will be sharply reduced, B. B. Johnson, president of the league, announced at Chicago on Tuesday. The game was conducted in an extravagant manner during the fight with the Federal League, Pres. Johnson said, and all expenses connected with the operation of the sport next season will be curtailed.


"Now that the trouble is over," he asserted, "we will have to return to a sound basis—one where men have invested their money in the same stand a

chance of obtaining a fair return. There will be no renewal of high salaried contracts. The players must understand that. We will agree on a new contract at the annual meeting of the American League in Chicago, Dec. 14, that will be fair to all concerned. It will be equitable to the player and to the club owner."
