SIR CHARLES HARDINGE London, July 12-Sir Charles Hardinge, whose appointment as Viceroy of India in succession to the Earl of Minto was officially announced on June 10, has been elevated to the peerage. Sir Charles Hardinge has been in the British diplomatic service since 1880. He was secretary of the embassy at St. Petersburg 1888-1893 and Ambassador in the same capital from 1904-1906. He was made Assistant Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs in 1903 and later became permanent Under Secretary in that department. He is fifty-two years of age and is a brother of Viscount Hardinge.

TUNISIAN STRUCK AND KILLED A WHALE

While passing through the Straits of Belle Isle at seventeen knots per hour, the Allan liner Tunisian, which docked at Montreal Friday night, ran into a huge whale which attempted to cross its bows. A slight shock to the passengers on board and a few crimson eddies was all that attended the occurrence.

It is not often that whales are met with in the Straits, their habit more commonly being the southern route. Before it was struck by the vessel the whale had been seen spouting. The liner on the voyage made her fastest passage this season, and carried a large number of well-provided settlers.

GIRL OF FIFTEEN ELOPES WITH MAN OF THIRTY

Miss Myrtle Saunders, of Nauwigewauk, Leaves Home With Douglas Sherwood—Questionable Business Methods of the Latter

Nauwigewauk, July 11—There has been considerable quiet excitement among the people of Quispamsis for the last few days because of the sudden departure for Boston of a man who has always been known to be somewhat of a recluse and a young girl of fifteen. The first intimation the parents of Myrtle Saunders had of her flight from home with Douglas Sherwood was contained in a note left by the latter, who wrote that they intended to be married and take the boat for Boston. As nothing has been heard of them since, it is presumed that they carried out their intention.

Quite early in the week Miss Myrtle, who is a daughter of Geo. Saunders, informed her mother that she intended to visit her sister for two or three days, and as there was nothing unusual in this, her absence would not have created any comment. But it happened that Mrs. Saunders became indisposed and sent one of her boys after his sister to call her to go home. The boy could not find Myrtle and returned with the explanatory note from Sherwood. The news was literally a bolt out of the blue, for both the mother and the girl and the relatives of Sherwood. Both families are very highly respected and while it was generally known that Myrtle had been taking Sherwood's mail to him, nothing in the nature of a flirtation was expected.

The peculiarities of Sherwood would indicate everything else than any tendency toward the serious passion. He was such a recluse that even his own family did not see him for days at a time. He spent all his waking hours in a work shop where he had a typewriter and conducted a tremendous correspondence with those who favored the business advertisements he inserted in American sporting papers. He was an expert canoe and boat builder and furnished members of the sporting fraternities with goods of this description; but he did not confine his sales to what he manufactured himself, including in his advertisements the goods he was able to purchase at wholesale rates from the manufacturers in both the United States and Canada. He was not always prompt in filling his orders and as in a good many cases the cash accompanied the orders, there were complaints from time to time from the Post Office Department that his correspondents claimed that Sherwood was falsing them.

This grew so serious that the postmaster in his vicinity was instructed not to deliver any registered mail either to Sherwood or to the numerous aliases that he assumed. He frequently changed the name signed to his advertisements and his sometimes had his mail addressed to Nauwigewauk, Nauwigewauk, Quispamsis and then again to Gouda Point. It was said that he did a profitable business for himself, and always had plenty of money. At any rate, the medium of the communications between his work shop, office and the home was Miss Myrtle Saunders, who apparently grew to like the quiet, retired chap who finally induced her to share his flight.

The time for their departure was apparently well chosen as the last and older brother of the girl were both in attendance at Camp Sussex. Mrs. Saunders is presumed at the looking action of her daughter, who was bright and popular and the friends of both parties are exceedingly indignant with Sherwood, who is between thirty and forty years of age, and whose career has been exceedingly varied.
