Previous to the time of his joining the staff of the Record he was for a few years Town Clerk of Sussex. He was well known in his home town and enjoyed the esteem of a large circle of friends. A few months ago Mr. McFeters was injured by being knocked down by a team of horses, suffering a broken leg and other injuries.

Mr. McFeters is survived by his wife and two sons; one sister, Mrs. H. H. Dwyer, of Truro, N. S., and one brother, Frederick, of Sussex.

The funeral will be held on Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from his late residence. Interment will be in Kirk Hill cemetery.

DARTMOUTH, N. S., Oct. 29—One person narrowly escaped death and two others serious injuries yesterday afternoon when a steam roller, which had been working on Portland street, ran amuck down to the ferry wharf and crashed into the account- ing office of the N. S. ferry commission. Two young women who were working in the office at the time, narrowly escaped injury when the roller crashed through the wall, the driver of the roller had a hair-breadth escape from death when he fell from the machine as it struck the building, the roller passing within a foot of his head as he lay upon the ground. Considerable damage was done to the office of the ferry commission.
