### GOLF.

#### Device to Aid Players.

A stroke-guiding device for golf players has been newly patented by Duff W. Flint of Cranston, R. I. It is especially designed to cure the vicious habit of "slicing" the ball.

In playing golf there is commonly a tendency, especially on the part of beginners, to bend too much the left or guiding arm at the elbow, thereby shortening the swing and causing the club to slice or engage the ball above instead of below its centre.

To remedy this difficulty, the player is told that he must hold his left arm rather rigid at the elbow, a requirement which the beginner does not find it easy to meet while making a stroke. Hence the usefulness of the above-mentioned device, which is a sort of brace, readily attachable to the player's arm and preventing it from bending beyond a certain limit. It is simply a broad band of leather or canvas, fastened with a couple of straps and buckles around the middle arm in such wise that a plate a metal, contained in a pocket of the band, extends (lengthwise on the arm) across the elbow joint on the inner side. The plate is slightly curved in the direction of its length to conform to the curvature of the arm, but when fixed in position by the buckle band, it permits the elbow to be flexed only slightly.

#### WHERE POLICEMEN REST.

First Contingent Off to Their Camp in the Catskills.

A group of big, husky fellows gathered up a bewildering assortment of bags and suitcases in a local station and passed them through the passenger gates to their train. There were other groups of men bent on a similar errand, but these particular fellows stood out because of the noticeably large physique of its members. They belonged to the first batch of New York's police force to start on their vacation, and they were bound for the city's police recreation camp.

This camp is situated at Platte Clove in the Catskill Mountains, 2,200 feet above sea level. The camp, which is both a health resort and vacation centre for policemen, has just completed the first year of its activities. It is for members of the department and their families only, and it enables them to spend a vacation at a nominal cost. The maximum number of persons accommodated at any one time during last season was about 100, this having been rendered possible by the use of about twenty army tents for extra sleeping quarters.

The camp has several buildings and is prepared to accommodate more vacationists than ever this season. Mountain Rest, the main building is called; it contains the office and dining room. It is now being enlarged to more than double its original capacity. When it is completed it will seat 200 persons. A porch has been extended across the front, and one end of the building has been provided with a balcony 10 feet wide and 180 feet long, overlooking the magnificent scenery of Platte Clove Gorge. There are several cottages, equipped with running water and electric lights. A concrete swimming pool, 25 by 75 feet, with bathhouses, shower baths and dressing rooms, is another attraction. A large reinforced concrete dam, holding 270,000 gallons of water, fed by mountain springs, furnishes an abundance of absolutely pure water for all the purposes of the camp. Mayor Hyman and Mrs. Hyman visited the camp last year.

### SEMI-FINALISTS IN WESTERN GOLF

Kansas City, Mo., June 29.—Chick Evans, of Chicago; George Von Elm, of Salt Lake City; Clarence Wolf, of St. Louis, and Fred Wright, of Los Angeles, will fight it out tomorrow in the semi-final rounds of the western amateur golf tournament on the Hillcrest course, as a result of their victories today.  
Evans and Von Elm had walkaways in their matches, but Wolf and Wright were victorious only after nerve-breaking struggles which produced beautiful golf.

### McCUMBER IS LIKELY BEATEN

Washington, June 30.—(Canadian Press)—Senator Porter J. McCumber is probably beaten for re-nomination in North Dakota, according to private telegrams reaching here. Senator Ladd, his colleague, has been advised that Senator McCumber is defeated by about 15,000. Senator McCumber is chairman of the senate finance committee.

Fargo, N. D., June 30.—Unofficial figures from 1,091 precincts out of 2,064, gave for the Republican senatorial nomination: P. J. McCumber, 54,125; L. J. Fraser, 49,063. O. Maharg, the third candidate had only 491.  
For the Republican gubernatorial nomination the same number of precincts gave Governor Nestor 65,268 and B. F. Baker, non partisan 43,671.

### LUNENBURG FLEET CATCH

Lunenburg, N. S., June 30.—The two spring fairs of the Lunenburg Grand Bank trawling fleet totalling 119,325 quintals, figures show. Eighty-three vessels were engaged. A small number of handlers are yet to arrive. Eight dollars a quintal was paid the schooners for the first catch of 49,575 quintals and the same price for two cargoes of the second trip which have been sold. This price is expected to remain the same.  
The vessels are now on their summer trip and reports are that so far they have met with utter failure. It is said it is too early yet for a pessimistic outlook, but some of the vessels at this time last year had 1,000 quintals of their summer fares. The summer trip normally is looked to as the big one of the season.

### RECORD NUMBER FOR ENGLAND ON THE MONTCAIM

Montreal, June 30.—What is believed to be the largest list of cabin passengers ever carried from the port of Montreal by any steamship will leave for England today on the Canadian Pacific liner Montcaim. C. P. R. officials said that she will carry more than 600 cabin passengers and 300 third class. The largest previous cabin passenger list was taken on the liner Regina, 527.

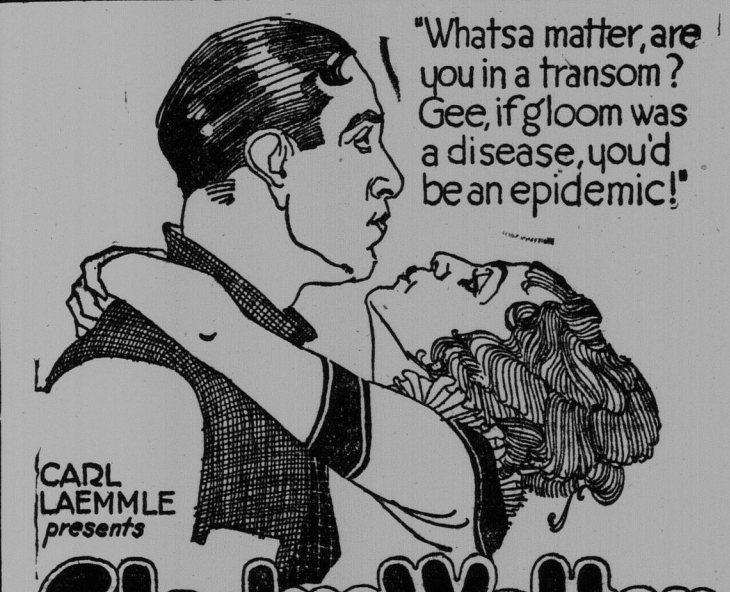
