IS CHARGED WITH WIFE MURDER

Allege Undertaker's Assistant
Gave Her Poison, Then
Kissed Her Good Night.

Bennington, Vt., June 22.—Byron M. Pettibone, an undertaker's assistant, was held for the grand jury yesterday charged with the murder of his wife, after Chief of Police Beaulieu had related an alleged confession in which the prisoner was quoted as saying he gave her poison in a dose of salts, kissed her good-night and then called a physician when she complained of pains. Pettibone has since repudiated the statements attributed to him.

WOMEN'S COUNCIL

At the afternoon session of the Women's National Council meeting yesterday the report of the committee on conservation of national resources was given by Mrs. Ralph Smith. Strong resolutions against the buying of Hearst publications were passed and sympathy with the government endeavors to stop their circulation in Canada was expressed. The report of the committee on supervised playgrounds was read by Mrs. Wolverton, Hamilton, and a resolution that the council take steps to form a national playgrounds association was passed. It was also decided to urge upon universities and educational departments to include courses in supervised playgrounds work in their courses. The report for the committee on women in industry was submitted by Mrs. Robinson and that on women in agriculture was presented by Mrs. L. A. Hamilton. It was decided that a committee should be formed in each province to seek out information on citizenship.

Evening Session.
The evening session opened with a short musical programme in which Miss Louise Knight, Miss Pauline Baird, Mrs. Blake Ferris, D. Arnold Fox, Miss Marion Hogan, Miss Lynch and Miss Loretta Connell took part. Mrs. E. Atherton Smith presided. Mrs. Harold Lawrence gave an interesting account of the reception of immigrants at this port for the last two years.
Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts also gave an interesting address in which he commended the women's movement and the work which they were undertaking. He spoke of the part taken by Mrs. David McLellan in the mental hygiene work in the province and advocated a revision in the system of education for girls.
Dr. Helen MacMurray told of the work of the child department in the dominion, of which she is head. At the close of the session a speech of appreciation was delivered by Mrs. Sanford.

GIVE \$10,000 TO CATCH THIEVES

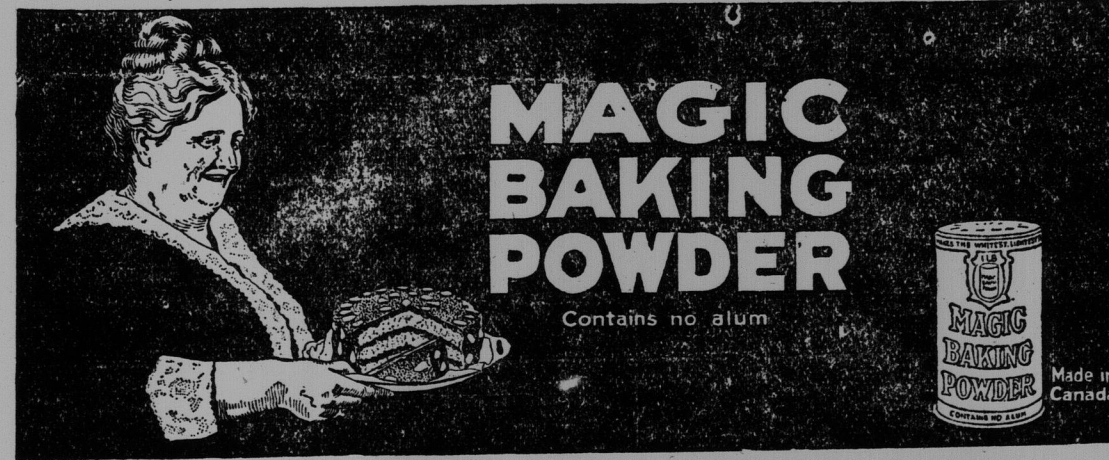
Reward for Information Following
Big Toronto Diamond Robbery.

Toronto, June 22.—A reward of \$10,000 has been offered by Abraham Rosenthal, diamond merchant, for information leading to the arrest of the bandits who held him up in his store in King street on last Friday evening and stole diamonds and jewelry estimated to be worth from \$50,000 to \$70,000, of which there was insurance of \$20,000.
