Berlin, Sept. 15.—Germany is offering remiums and rewards aggregating 200,000,000 marks as an inducement to the ivil population to give up its military veapons, and as an evidence of her sincere endeavor to disarm.

Germany is preparing to literally turn er war sword into a plowshare of seace. All metal from the rifles, mahine guns and cannons turned in by the opulation will be melted down and reast into agricultural implements and nachinery parts.

It is estimated that approximately one nillion and a half military rifles, sevral thousand machine guns and tens of housands of army revolvers are still in he hands of the civilians. The presium for a rifle is 100 marks, and up to 00 for machine guns. 


