DISARMAMENT

IN GERMANY

Berlin, Sept. 15.—Germany is offering premiums and rewards aggregating 200,000 marks as an inducement to the civil population to give up its military weapons, and as an evidence of her sincere endeavor to disarm.

Germany is preparing to literally turn her war sword into a plowshare of peace. All metal from the rifles, machine guns and machine guns are still in the population will be melted down and re-used into agricultural implements and machinery parts.

It is estimated that approximately one million and a half military rifles, several thousand machine guns and tens of thousands of army revolvers are still in the hands of the civilians. The premium for a rifle is 100 marks, and up to 200 for machine guns. Up to the present the offers have had but little effect in inducing the giving up of arms. Avarice stands solidly against giving up arms of her civil guards. Even the officials announce that any member who reports the location of weapons will be penalized by his party.

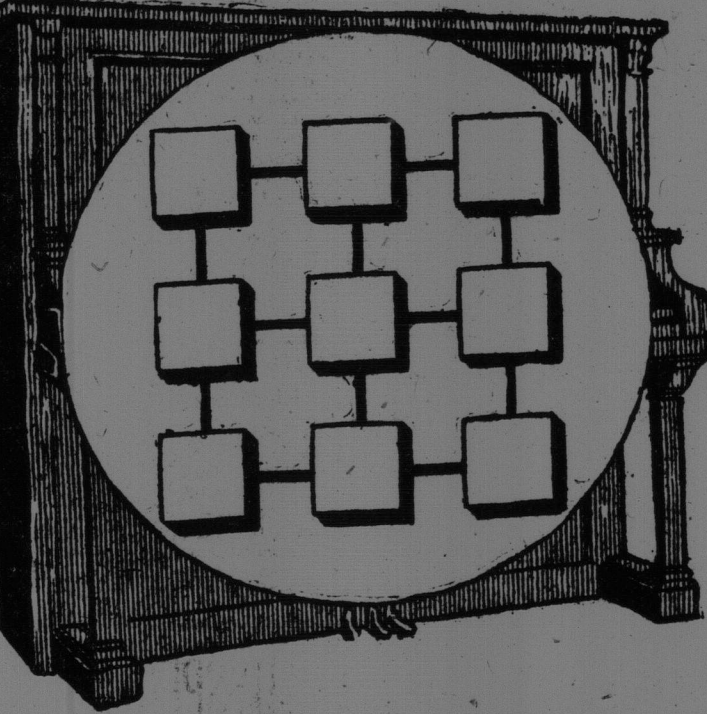

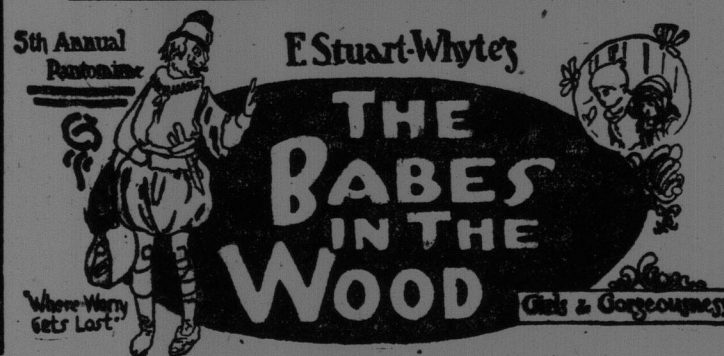

PASSING OF STONE PILE

Penitentiary Conditions Improved, Says Committee of Social Service.

The penitentiary conditions in Canada have much improved in the report of the Penological Committee of the Social Service Council of Canada. There had admittedly been irregularities in administration, but great improvements had followed new appointments. The industrial

system has almost abolished the stone pile. The committee suggests that the stone pile and unproductive work be abolished, the money a prisoner earns in productive work being used for the support of his dependents. With regard to women, it is recommended that they be incarcerated outside the penitentiary walls, that cells for them be abolished and women doctors employed to look after them.
