The value of the public bequests, after \$25,000,000 is set aside for his widow, son and daughter, is \$117,000,000, exclusive of 151 acres of Pittsburg real es-

tate, left for a public park. 



THE MINTO SITUATION

Fredericton, N. B., Dec. 8-It was said Fredericton, N. B., Dec. 8—It was said today that the United Mine Workers of America are preparing for a long drawn out struggle in the strike which started Saturday at the Minto Coal Company's mines.

"We have our feet braced for a long fight, if necessary," declared William Hayes, of Springhill, N. S., board member in charge of the Minto situation for the U. M. W.

"I don't believe we will resort to the proposal to transport the miners from Minto to Western Canada, as was suggested," said Mr. Hayes. "It was our intention to do that, but for the sake of this community, we don't want to have to resort to such extremities. There will be no suffering on the part of the strikers. They will be paid strike benefits and there will always be something for them to get along on, so that neither the miners nor their families will have to go hungry."

In an attempt to provide fuel for the industries and other users with whom they have contracts, the Minto Coal Company are opening up a stripping area in the coal fields near their mines from which it is expected large quantities of coal can be taken by means of steam

shovels and without any mining operashoves and we note any mining opera-tions being necessary.

"Everything is quiet and there is no indication of any bad feeling or any likelihood," said John Henderson, manager of the Minto Coal Company, this af-
