Montreal, Aug. 17—When she fell from a swing on to a pile of burning sticks, a little girl, seven years of age, 1285 Delacour street, was burnt to death. The girl had gone to a friend's place at 628 Belloc street, and was swinging in the garden. She had the swing carry her too high, and slipping, she fell into a bon fire.

The children with her shrieked and the parents, rushing from the house, pulled the girl from the swing. She was rushed to the Royal Victoria Hospital, and every effort was made to save her life, but the burns which covered every part of her body were too severe.

**ONTARIO GERMAN DENOUNCES KAISER**

Condemns Him as Leader of An "Insane Military Government"

THE FOE OF EUROPE

The Present Struggle, He Declares, is Not German People's War—He Stands Against Any and All Enemies of Britain

Woodstock, Ont., Aug. 18—Professor F. V. Rietveld, of the staff of Woodstock College, and a former German soldier, has written a remarkable letter denouncing the German Emperor, which was published in the Sentinel-Review of this city. After stating that the quarrel in the present war is not with the German people, Professor Rietveld says:

"We must deeply sympathize with the German people in the sufferings and dangers brought upon them by their ruling classes, by their oligarchic, insane, military government. It is the Germany of the clenched fist and drawn sword, of the shining armor and the sabre rattling in the scabbard that calls for no sympathy on our part. It is the Germany that has precipitated the monstrous world struggle of the day that fills us all with horror and indignation. I am a native German and former German soldier. My own position in this struggle is perfectly clear. My loyalty to the British flag makes me stand against any and all enemies of Britain. If need be I should even fight against Germany, though with a bleeding heart. Furthermore, I desire disaster to the German army in this war for the reason that it will mean restoration of fellowship again in the western nations for one of the greatest peoples of Europe. A liberated, free, democratic Germany will start on a new and lasting era of prosperity, of peace, arm in arm with England and France. Germany's defeat will mean the establishment of a German republic and the elimination of William II, and all that he stands for. Such things as Divine right and the intelligence of the people of the 20th century, William II. is the common foe of Europe and he must be eliminated. Defeat of Germany in this war means ultimate salvation and freedom for her. Germany will be the greatest gainer through defeat."

**RECENT DEATHS**

James Pettigell, an aged and highly respected resident of Quispamsis, near Hothesay, dropped dead in his hayfield yesterday afternoon, closing an unusually healthy and vigorous life. Mr. Pettigell was seventy-eight years of age, and had always enjoyed good health. He was assisting in the field yesterday afternoon when he was seen to stagger and fall, and picked up unconscious he passed away before medical aid could be summoned. Heart failure is attributed as the cause of death. He is survived by his wife and four children—William, at home; J. Percy, of this city; Mrs. W. W. Leonard, of Hothesay, and Mrs. Geo. Sampson, of Oregon.

John H. Currie, aged 77, died at his home in Richmond Corner, near Woodstock, on Sunday evening. Death was due to paralysis.
