OFFICER ENDS LIFE IN NEW YORK HOTEL

Lieut. C. P. McMichael Shot Himself When Questioned by Army Men—Motive for Act Unknown

New York, Jan. 26—Lieutenant Charles P. McMichael of the Army Medical Corps, which is in camp at Allentown, Pa., shot and killed himself in the Hotel Claridge, Forty-fourth street and Broadway, here, Monday night.

McMichael was unquestionably an officer who had called to see him, evidently fearing he was to be permitted to leave for leaving camp without permission.

The lieutenant, a son of a Philadelphia judge, and said to have been related to the Bidde family, remained at the hotel and went directly to the room assigned to him and his presence, telephoning at meal times, that he had food sent up for him.

McMichael was unquestionably an officer who had called to see him, evidently fearing he was to be permitted to leave for leaving camp without permission.
