

SPORT NEWS OF THE DAY, HOME AND ABROAD

Veterans Tournament.
The Great War Veterans skating tournament, which was held in the Victoria rink last evening, was one of the best of its kind ever held in this city and reflects credit on the association, and in particular on the chairman, Philip Moore, and his secretary, G. M. Parlee.

One of the largest crowds that ever attended a skating meet was in attendance and enthusiasm ran high from the beginning until the last man crossed the line in the final event.

The events were all keenly contested and despite the poor condition of the ice the time in many of the races was good.

St. Peter's Y. M. C. A. boys won the major number of points and thereby won a magnificent silver trophy. Their representatives captured no less than three first places and four second. They would also have won the final in the 440 yards, but Joe Dever, who crossed the line a winner, was disqualified as the referee alleged that he had cut off three of the blocks.

The most interesting event on the programme was the relay race between a team from St. Peter's Y. M. C. A. and the Vics. Own. The St. Peter's boys carried the ribbon in front until the last lap when Logan, representing the Vics, sprinted and passed the St. Peter's boy and crossed a winner by a few feet. The applause from the time the race started until it ended was deafening.

Another event which won the admiration of the large assemblage was the three mile grind, which was won by W. Bell. The skaters ploughed away until the thirty-eighth lap and then sprinted and maintained a sprint pace until they finished.

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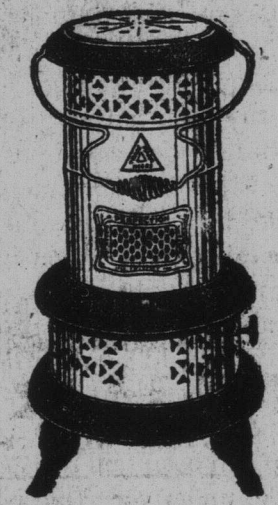

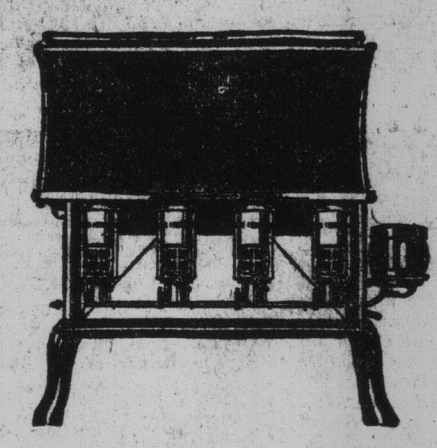

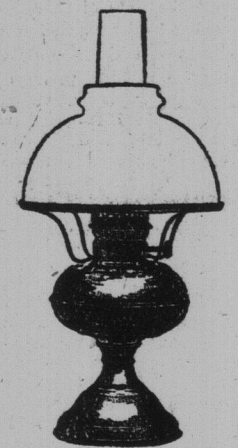
