DR. BOURQUE IN DENIAL

I. C. R. Pass Inquiry at Moncton —Will Likely Be Finished Today

(Special to Times)

Moncton, N. B., Oct. 11.—The I. C. R. pass inquiry was resumed this morning. Joseph Bourque gave further evidence regarding the circumstances under which Ray Vye left town after the pass master became public and told more about visiting Dr. L. N. Bourque's office and company with A. E. Holstead and of seeing unpunctured tickets in his possession.

A. E. Holstead, druggist, said that four or five years ago he told Doctor Bourque and Joseph Bourque that he was going to St. John and Doctor Bourque said he thought he had the return portion of a ticket from St. John to Moncton not out of date that he would give him. They went to Doctor Bourque's office and Doctor Bourque produced four or five return portions of tickets, but none of them was of any use to the witness. Yesterday they visited Sarnaby county with W. W. Hubbard, and inspected the bearing orchards and the progress of the new plantings. At A. G. Turner's farm at Burton they saw 2,500 young trees in a thrifty condition and a good potato crop among them.

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GAMBLER STUNG BY JAP

Marsh's Valet Mistakenly Played for an Easy One by Professional Traveler

Among the thousands of Japanese heroes who arrived on these shores following the signing of the treaty of Portsmouth was Sanako Oka, who is distinguishable in any company for a quality of folly similar to that inherent in the dog fox and whose countenance under strong emotion can be almost if not quite as expressive as the moon in eclipse, says the New York Herald. He is a fond of European travel, as it affords him infinite variety in his pet pastime of skulking fortifications, making batteries and redoubts, and his favorite authors are the compilers of the financial columns in the newspapers of France, Germany and the United States.

Soon after his arrival in the United States he entered the service of Henry W. Marsh, having discovered that Mr. Marsh was connected with the United States Steel corporation, which is not without reputation even in the remote villages of Japan. Mr. Marsh went abroad last June and returned recently on board the Lusitania, the Canadian line. It is unnecessary to say that Sanako Oka went and came along with Mr. Marsh, since first making Sanako's acquaintance, has maintained that there is only one valet in the world.

In his opinion he is backed up by a certain habitual ocean voyager for revenue only, whose description is familiar to the smoke room stewards of all the steamships of all sorts and conditions. The traveler, who shall not be identified with, left his port on board the Lusitania the last time he steamed eastward, and met such excellent fortune that who lost their way, the Lusitania reached Liverpool he hurried across to pier to the Carmarthen, remembered the gambler's expectation that his luck might desert him if he failed to follow it up.

To his dismay, however, he found the Carmarthen no better place. The men he cultivated in the smoke room talked art, politics and travel, but had no sense to report. The man of action found nothing at all to do until Tuesday night, when Mr. Marsh's valet consented to play with him to allow himself to be shown how to play the American game of poker. The gambler had appropriated the bill in a modest roll of currency notes in a selected corner of the deck.

"Why, what is this?" Mr. Marsh inquired.

But the honorable gentleman, "superstitious," he insists in his perfect English: "he accused me of hogging everything when I refused to play, and he was absolutely most generously declined to take his right eye."

CANADA TO DOMINATE ALL NORTH AMERICA

Opinions of New Imperial Trade Commissioner on Business Matters

Toronto, Oct. 11.—C. Hamilton Wickes, newly appointed imperial trade commissioner to Canada and Newfoundland, called in an interview here a remark made by him in a car between Toronto and Winnipeg more than ten years ago to the effect that Canada's ultimate commercial destiny was to dominate the whole of North America. He reiterated that opinion but declared that the day would never come until Canada had dominion over the continent of North America.

Saying that Canada, by accepting the costs of the Underwriters' Laboratory Corporation of Chicago voluntarily shut herself off from the manufacturers of the rest of the world, Mr. Wickes asked: "Is Canada always to play the part of the baby, holding up her hands to the United States?"

To put Canada plainly, he continued, "Canada humbly accepts the dictation of the United States as being the sole repository of wisdom in the whole world in respect to articles of public utility."

"In this way the Canadian manufacturer lays himself open to the competition of his neighbor just across the border, and is content to accept his orders, without throwing the market open to the whole world, and thereby profiting by the experience of other countries."

RECENT DEATHS

The death of Mary Laura Coleman occurred at her home in Germain street yesterday. She was forty-eight years of age and had been ill for only a week. She was a daughter of the late John and Olivia Coleman and is survived by two sisters, Mrs. J. V. Thomson of Boston and Miss Ada, at home.

Verdict of \$1,000 Against Mayor

Victoria, Oct. 11.—Damages to the amount of \$1,000 against Mayor Beckwith and \$30 against Chief of Police Langley were awarded by a jury in favor of Roy Barnum, a "hypnotist," whose performances were stopped by order of the mayor on March 8 and 9. Barnum sued for \$25,000.

The jury threw out the charge of malicious prosecution, but awarded the damages for false arrest. The decision will be appealed.

BUSINESS REPORT

John S. Vincent, the King street contractor and restaurateur, has been absent from the city for about three weeks. He left without notice to the employees in his store, and it was several days before it was learned that he had departed. The business has been continued, and it is possible that it will be carried along continuously. H. J. Smith, representing the capital invested in the business, is now conducting an inquiry to learn how things stand. He said this morning that he did not think that the liabilities were serious, but that the business had been suffering from loose management and that matters were so tangled that it was difficult to learn where Mr. Vincent stood when he left the city.

INQUIRY INTO RAILWAY RATES IS ADJOURNED

Ottawa, Oct. 11.—With the completion of the presentation of the case for the Grand Trunk Pacific, which followed that of the Canadian Pacific Railway and Canadian Northern Railway freight inquiry, the railway board adjourned yesterday afternoon to meet again on November 4. It is understood none of the railways has closed its case yet.

The adjournment will give the lawyers time to go over the mass of figures presented by the railways, including rate reductions and comparisons, statements of variations in density of traffic east and west and higher cost of operation.

YARMOUTH NEXT WEEK

The steamer Yarmouth of the D. A. R. line is now in Boston being overhauled in preparation for going on the winter service between St. John and Digby. She is expected to arrive here to commence regular sailings next week.
