CLONDBURST DOES GREAT DAMAGE IN PITTSBURG SUBURBS

Pittsburg, Sept. 15.—(Canadian Press)—Damage estimated at \$100,000 was done and several lives were reported lost in a cloudburst which swept Etina, Sharpsburg and Millvale, suburbs of Pittsburg, early today.

Trains of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad were washed out and all trains to Butler and Newcastle have been cancelled. Main line trains are being sent over the Pittsburg & Lake Erie railroad to Newcastle Junction.

VOTE IN MAINE MAY BE FOR PROHIBITION

Apparent Majority of 134 Against But There Are Inaccuracies in Returns

Portland, Maine, Sept. 15.—An apparent majority of 134 votes for repeal of the liquor prohibitory amendment of the Maine constitution was announced in a statement issued last night by the secretary of state, Cyrus Davis, as the outcome of the election.

The secretary's report is based on signed returns from town clerks except in the case of the two cities and three towns which reports have not yet been received. Secretary Davis has, however, filled in the missing figures from press returns, which he believes to be correct.

Certain discrepancies which indicate errors by town officials in returning the figures as received. These discrepancies are declared by leaders of the anti-repeal side to be sufficient to change the result to a "dry" majority.

Press returns compiled in the city indicate a "dry" majority of 266, taking into account the alleged discrepancies in town clerks' reports.

WOUNDED NUMBERED MORE THAN 133,000—FIGURES JUST GIVEN OUT OFFICIALLY TELL OF AWFUL COST OF VICTORY

Berlin, Sept. 15.—Details of Japanese casualties in the war with Russia, which have hitherto been withheld from public knowledge, are furnished to the "Morning Freiheit" by Surgeon-General Dr. Akizama, a professor at the Army Medical Academy in Tokyo, who is now in Berlin.

The tables have been drawn up by Dr. Mori, the head of the medical department in the Japanese war ministry, and are thus absolutely authentic.

The first table gives the numbers of killed and wounded in the seven important engagements and battles of the war. In the battle of Kintcho, which lasted two days, there were killed thirty-five officers and 693 men, and wounded 111 officers and 3,850 men.

In the battle of Valanku, which lasted two days, there were killed eight officers and 292 men, and wounded forty-four officers and 1,282 men.

In the battle of the Tumen, which lasted three days, there were killed thirteen officers and 192 men, and wounded 105 officers and 3,123 men.

The names of the remaining four battles are not given, so they must be distinguished by number. In the battle No. 4, which lasted twelve days, there were killed 222 officers and 5,325 men, and wounded 408 officers and 11,200 men.

In battle No. 5, which lasted thirteen days, there were killed 119 officers and 2,917 men, and wounded 203 officers and 15,273 men.

In the engagement of August 19, there were killed thirty-five officers and 1,734 men, and wounded 249 officers and 10,728 men.

In battle No. 7, there were killed 558 officers and 15,893 men, and wounded 3,709 officers and 11,562 men.

A second table gives the number of killed and wounded in the most important engagements before Port Arthur. In the engagement of July 26 to July 31, there were killed twenty-four officers and 427 men, and wounded 112 officers and 3,278 men.

In the engagement of August 19, there were killed 308 officers and 4,800 men, and wounded 398 officers and 10,464 men.

In the engagement of September 10 to September 27, there were killed 103 officers and 574 men, and wounded 130 officers and 5,789 men.

In the engagement of October 11, there were killed thirty-four officers and 783 men, and wounded eighty-seven officers and 1,210 men.

In the engagement of November 6, there were killed 204 officers and 4,834 men, and wounded 430 officers and 11,562 men.

These figures total 1968 officers and 40,881 killed and 4619 officers and 129,100 wounded.

MURDER CASE WITH FEATURES DEMANDING A SHERLOCK HOLMES

Minneapolis, Minn., Sept. 15.—A double tragedy which offers unusual elements of mystery, is revealed on a little farm north of Minneapolis. In the cellar of the farmhouse, terribly beaten was found last night the body of Mrs. Walter Bolton, wife of a bar tender, while under a few inches of fresh earth in the garden, was discovered the body of Mrs. Bolton's son, Frank Rhodes, who has been employed on the farm, has not been seen for two or three days. During the day Bolton received a letter from his wife saying that she was well and happy.

BETTING ON MORRIS

New York, Sept. 15.—For the battle of heavy weights tonight, Carl Morris, of Tulsa, Okla., and Jim Flynn, odds in Morris' favor, had him 2 to 1. Hitherto practically no money has been wagered here on the result of the battle. This was mainly because the Oklahoma giant is an unknown quantity in the east. The bout is expected to net about \$50,000. If Morris shows decisive superiority tonight his friends will proclaim him king of the white hopes, with little fear of contradiction.

Railroad Shops Burn

Indianapolis, Ind., Sept. 14.—Five destroyed five buildings of the Cleveland, Cincinnati and St. Louis railroad shops at Brighton yesterday. The loss is estimated at \$300,000.
