> ARCTIC LAND EXPEDITION.—Letters have been received from Mess. Dease and Simpson, dated at Fort Confidence. Great Bear Lake, September 16, 1838, giving a narrative of their unsuccessful attempt to explore the residue of the eastern part of the Arctic sea. The season was cold and extremely unfavorable. and they were able to advance with their boats only to a point three miles from the site of Franklins farthest encampment in 1821. Mr. Simpson with a part of the company, advanced on foot 100 miles farther to lat. 68, 43, 39, lon. 1063. They propose to renew the attempt the present season, in hopes of finding more o en sea.
