

## MOVING TO ONTARIO

Cotton's wants to move to Ontario. This is a business move. It is not only a question of sentiment; it is a question of hard dollars and cents.

It is due to the Honorable Adam Beck's hydro-electric power. As you know, the capitalist system is constantly revolutionizing itself, and new circumstances mean new moves.

Adam Beck claims that his power policy will make Old Ontario a hive of industry. He is right. For cheap power means that those plants located where that power is obtained will have a better chance of surviving.

Cotton's Weekly is supplied by a six horse power gasoline engine. The International Harvester people figure that it takes a gallon a day per horse power to run these engines.

When Cotton's started publishing in Cowansville gasoline was fifteen cents a gallon, and there was no government power in Ontario. Today gasoline costs twenty-six cents a gallon. With three hundred working days a year, the cost for each horse power for gasoline alone is \$78 per year.

In Berlin, Ont., electric power is sold for \$22.50 per year. The difference is \$55.50 per year in favor of Ontario for each horse power used. At present power costs us \$300 a year more than if we were in Berlin, or some other place where cheap power can be got.

When the circulation of Cotton's goes to 50,000, we will have to install a rotary press, and, if we stay in Cowansville, install a 15 horse power engine. When we make the change, would it not be better to locate where we can get the cheaper power?

But, comrades, the present report looks as though the change is afar off. There is a loss this week instead of a gain.

Do you Ontario comrades want us in your midst? Do you western comrades want us two days nearer you, and where we can arrange to put on speakers to help spread the paper? Do you eastern comrades want us where we can be of far greater use to the movement through a more central location, a bigger press and greater printing facilities?

Then above in the subs. Go out today or tonight and rustle up a bunch of subscribers. Break into new territory.

## MONTREAL MAY DAY PARADE

A definite statement has now been issued by the secretary of the May Day Conference in regard to the Socialist demonstration which will be held on Thursday, May 1st. The conference of the following Socialist organizations took place in Montreal on Tuesday, April 23rd.

Industrial Workers of the World. Local No. 2, Socialist Party of Canada. (French). Russian Social-Democrats. Polish Socialist Party. Canadian Socialist Democratic Party. Jewish Socialist Party. Lithuanian Socialist Party. Young Socialist Federation of Montreal. Fabian Society.

These bodies took up the matter of the usual May Day Parade of Socialists and Trade Unionists and issued a circular letter to the following workers in different craft unions in this city, inviting them to join in the May Day demonstration.

The parade will start from the corner of Prince Arthur and St. Lawrence Sts. at 7 p.m., 1st May, and march down the main cross over Craig street, on to the Champ de Mars, where meetings will be held and speeches delivered in the different languages, after which the parade will reassemble and go to the Colonial Hall, 235 Clarke street, via St. Denis and St. Catherine streets, where speeches will be delivered and a ball held.

The Agitation Battery has been at work in Quebec and the Maritime Provinces, also Newfoundland. The total amount raised to date, on the Reduce the Debt Campaign is \$21.46. The money is being used to help the workers in the Maritime Provinces.

## Socialism is encircling the globe.

Lawyers are a useless class. They fatten off labor.

Judges are a useless class. They thrive on the crime the capitalist system produces.

Capitalism has had its sway. It will soon peter out. Gorged with feeding on labor, it has taken to eating itself.

Workers, don't look up to the idle, well-dressed capitalists. They are of no more use than the tramp. They are robbing you of the fruits of your labors.

The capitalists will be considered about as much use to the working class as an apple worm is to an apple tree, when the workers get wise.

The doctor is a useful citizen—to those who can afford to pay his fees. Only the kindness of his heart enable those who can't afford to pay to secure medical attendance.

Workers produce the wealth. Are you getting your share of the wealth you produce? No. Then the system is wrong, and it's up to you to do your share to change it.

The soldier belongs to the most utterly useless class that the earth has ever been cursed with. He produces nothing but sorrow and misery, tears and poverty.

The capitalists can easily dodge the laws of the country. It remains for the working class to obey them one and all. When the worker has not the cash consideration the lawyers swing to the man with the roll.

The Socialists are working seven days of the week for Christianity. If working to make the living conditions of the workers better is not a Christian act, then Christianity must be for the rich alone.

The right to be lazy at least two weeks every year should be the right of all workers. How many workers have this right with their full pay for this two weeks' vacation? Mum is the word.

The capitalist system is responsible for race suicide. The workers don't get wages enough to raise a family properly, so won't raise one at all. Capitalism thus destroys the homes which Socialism would make.

Socialism has one aim, one goal. It's aim is to free the workers from wage slavery by doing away with rent, interest and profit, and when this is accomplished we have reached the goal. Christianity will then be applied.

Why is it that under the capitalist system workers doing dirty work toil long hours for small wages, and workers doing clean work, labor short hours and get larger pay in return for their labors, when both are doing necessary work? The system is punk.

The La Roca mine, after paying all working expenses, made a profit of \$74,104 in the month of March. This profit was made by the workers, but they only received in wages just enough to buy food, clothing and shelter so that they can continue to toil on. The \$74,104 goes to the idlers.

The politicians are having a regular tug-of-war at Ottawa. The Conservatives are pulling against the Liberals, but both of them are pulling on the same rope. The winning side will get the graft. The politicians are not making all this hubbub for nothing. Workers, cannot you see the game?

Twenty years ago you would have been laughed at if you had said that men would navigate the air. Some workers say that Socialism is all right, but it will never come. Nothing is impossible. Socialism is coming fast in spite of what the capitalists say to the contrary. It is the workingmen's world-wide political party.

Preparations are being made at Toronto for the reception of the party of one hundred business men and capitalists, representing the leading industrial and financial interests of Germany who are to tour Canada this summer. During their stay in Toronto the visitors will be entertained by the Ontario government, the city, the Canadian Manufacturers' Association and the Toronto Board of Trade. The Dominion government are loudly proclaiming that England needs help to build a big navy on account of the German peril while the Ontario government are making arrangements to entertain one hundred German capitalists who will tour Canada this summer. If the Germans are Britain's enemies, why welcome them? If they are not enemies, why raise war scares?

Some workers object to being called slaves. They say they are free. If the capitalists wanted a war to start against Canada, they could start it. Sam Hughes would order you to take up arms, and you would have to do it if you were not physically disabled. Are you free? If you don't pay your debts the sheriff can step in and take your little property from you and sell it. Are you free? Borden can take \$35,000,000 of your money and give it away, and you can't stop him. If you take a holiday to christen the new baby the boss will fire you when you go back and if you give any lip will blacklist you so you cannot get another job in your line. Conscription can be forced on you and your sons by the war lords four thousand miles away. They don't have to ask your consent. The bullying policeman can stick his fist under your nose or bat you with a blackjack, and then haul you to court and wear you into jail any time the spirit moves him. Are you free? The Southern slave was as free as an eagle compared with the worker of today, and the Southern slave didn't consider himself free by any means.

In Cowansville there are 17 stores, employing about 40 clerks. One large departmental store with about 12 clerks could handle the business of these 17 stores, and sell goods at 25 per cent. less than now charged. The city department stores are fast putting the little storekeeper out of business. The 17 individual stores, each buying a small quantity of merchandise, cannot compete with the large city department stores who buy most of their goods in car lots, for cash. The small country store is doomed. The parcel post will help to hasten its downfall. This will throw some of the little capitalists into the ranks of the working class and then they will realize what it is to be a wage-slave under capitalism and will be as eager for a change as the Socialists are.

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## Kamloops, B.C., on the Map

Not having read anything in your paper regarding this neck of the woods, I thought I would write you a few lines with regard to the movement as I see it in this locality.

Socialism is gaining ground more rapidly than many of us are aware. The country is practically honeycombed with Socialists, and among the farmers you see small groups gathered in their school houses in keen discussion of economics. Slowly but surely they are losing their inherent, shall I say prejudice, against Socialism, and the terrible imagined effects of such a system of industry. As the wheels of capitalism grind them lower and lower they are proving to join our ranks.

The fruit growers of the Okanagan Valley are cutting down their peach orchards this spring. There was such a poor market last year that much of the fruit was not gathered. Lack of transportation facilities was the reason given in the press why the market was so poor.

The same reason is ascribed for wheat having such a poor market in the prairie provinces. Such is not the real reason. The real reason is not hard to find and can be found in the fact that the farm is being factoryized. Large capitalists are rolling into fruit farming and grain growing, and by employment of modern methods and large machines can produce and distribute their products at a cost so low that the small farmer cannot more than exist, and often the market is closed to him altogether.

This is one reason that our propaganda is finding such favor among the rural communities. This is true of British Columbia, and in the next provincial election we may count on a very substantial increase of our voting strength. Local Kamloops has been recognized and taken on a new lease of life. The heaven is working. Comrade Knight, of Edmonton, Alta., was here recently and Com. Cassidy of Calgary is scheduled for May Day. The place shows big signs of growth along the lines of revolutionary Socialism. A. Bentley.
