Your letter of the 29th ultime, addressed to the Secretary of the Department, has been brought to my attention. I am sorry that I cannot give you assurance, in the event of your undertaking the cultivation of any portion of the Glebe property of uninterrupted enjoyment. It may be that any time in the near future we may decide to have this property subdivided into lots and sold. If the survey work is to be undertaken in the spring a certain amount of damage would be done to the standing grop, and in the event of sale purchasers would want immediate possession. If, however, you are willing to assume all risk, either of damage to your grop or of disposal of the property before the harvest could be gathered, I see no objection to allowing you to put the portion of the property to which you refer between the Hamilton Radial and the sanal under a grop of rye.

If these terms are acceptable, and you will advise me, you will be given formal authority to eccupy the property.
