MEXICAN RAILWAY MEN ALL AGREE TO RESIGN. MEXICO CITY, Mex., Feb. 7.—That the American engineers and conductors on the Inter-oceanic on the national lines of Mexico have so far voted without a dissenting voice to resign, was the report received here today from the men now canvassing the employers. Representatives of the union who are on the central branch report that 90 per cent. of the men so far appointed have cast their ballots for resignation. In Mexico City the men are voting almost unanimously to leave the service. The joint committee of engineers and conductors will meet here on February 7 to count the ballots and officially tender their resignations.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Feb. 7.—Stockholders of the St. Louis, Iron Mountains and Southern R.R., today, at a meeting here, voted to increase the capital stock to \$190,000,000. The increase is \$60,000,000. The absorption of twenty three auxiliary lines and an increase of \$23,000,000 in the bonded indebtedness, out of which the lines will be improved, were voted on favorably.

NEW YORK, Feb. 7.—Holdings of the Harriman estate which heretofore practically controlled Wells, Fargo and Company, have been liquidated, according to an unconfirmed report current in New York today. It is also reported, apparently authoritative, that the Southern Pacific company has sold its stock holdings in the company.

BOSTON, Mass., Feb. 7.—The wool and woven schedules of the new tariff were given the approval of their main construction of the National Association of Wool Manufacturers at its 45th annual meeting held in Boston late today.
