"The honorable member for Richmond (N. S.), (Mr. KYTE), however, made statements late on Tuesday evening as to the connection of the minister of militia with certain contracts entered into by the shell committee and as to the enormous profits or commissions arising out of these contracts to certain companies which he mentioned.

"I therefore propose to recommend to his royal highness, the governor-general, that a royal commission shall issue appointing one or more judges to make a thorough investigation into these four contracts and all matters connected therewith."
