NOTES AND NEWS.

NOVA SCOTIA.
The Chemical Fire Engine ordered
from Boston by the merchants of Am-
herst has arrived in this place.

The efficiency of the water supply and
fire department of Halifax, as shown at
the late fire at the International Hotel,
has led the insurance companies to re-
duce their rates.

Oswald Joggis, one of the rescued pas-
sengers of the wrecked steamer Atlantic,
subscribed \$100 towards the fund raised
in New York for the benefit of the fisher-
men of Mar's Island, to whom he says
hundreds of passengers are indebted for
their lives.

A gentleman from one of the Western
towns, who arrived in Halifax by train
on Monday evening, reports that he lost,
somewhere between Kentville and Hal-
ifax, a valise containing about \$1000 in
money and some valuable papers. He
remembers having the valise when at
Kentville, but does not know when or
where it was removed from the car, as he
did not miss it until he arrived at Rich-
mond.

The divers are doing well at the pre-
sent time in the recovery of cargo from
the Atlantic wreck. During the past two
days a large quantity has been brought
up, consisting in part of some two thou-
sand bars of copper. The schooner *Daisy*,
with the salvage portion of the cargo,
is discharging at the city wharf. To fa-
cilitate operations, it is intended to have
a barge, or a small tug, towed to the
bodies, to be used as a working boat, and
recovered yesterday, but so disfigured by
being so long in the water, that they were
beyond all chance of recognition.

J. J. Sawyer, Esq., for forty years Sher-
iff of the County of Halifax, died at his
residence on Wednesday last. Mr. Saw-
yer was born in Gloucester, Mass., and
landed in Halifax at the same time as the
Shannon and Chesapeake, after their en-
gagement near Boston, and was in the
harbor to their moorings in the dockyard.
Mr. Sawyer was the first City Marshal in
Halifax, after its incorporation in 1841,
and was the sixth oldest barrister in No-
va Scotia, dying at the age of seventy-
five years.

UNITED STATES.

has succumbed to the inevitable, and has
determined to write a book. Shepard &
Gill, of Boston, will publish it very soon,
under the title of *Life in Danbury*. It
will contain the best of the humorous
articles furnished in the *Nees* during the
last three years, and much more fresh
matter.

It appears from a statement published in
the New York Times that the imports
for the year ending 30th of June, 1872,
amounted to \$33,668,298 in gold value,
while the exports to Canada for the same
period only reached \$27,541,218, leaving
a balance of trade against the port of
\$11,127,080.

A Newark reporter and a New York
reporter went prowling about a graveyard
in Newark Saturday night, looking for
the ghost of "Frank Forrester," who the
superstitions say has been wont to walk
the night. Each was on an onerous hor-
ror, and presently one was sure he saw
the ghost, and the other was positive
that the Devil was before him. The ghost
and the Devil pursued him, and both
wrote a most harrowing account of their
experiences. They had encountered each
other in the dark, and a lighted cigar
had made the Devil of him from New
York.

Two men are under sentence of death in
Baltimore for murder. One of them,
Hathaway, has made a confession that is
horrible in its cold-blooded atrocity. He
says: I talked the matter over with Ni-
cholson, who was the grandson of the
lady killed, and he insisted that it would
be necessary to kill the old woman, as she
would not be able to tell on him, and peo-
ple would not think he would do such a
thing, but if they robbed her they would
suspect him at once. On the 2nd of
January I went to Nicholson's house,
and found that Lampley's family were
going to the theatre, leaving the old lady
alone, and we determined to do the job
that night. We went to the house, and
found the old lady sitting in a rocking
chair sewing. She treated us to cake and
wine, and was putting up some cake to
send to Nicholson's children I choked her,
and Nicholson kicked her in the stomach.
She died very soon.

Anarchy in the States.
The following extract from a Boston
paper reads strangely like Mexican
news:

A dispatch from Little Rock, Arkansas,
states that Gov. Baxter remains in the
Capital night and day with a force of
men on duty fully armed to protect him
against the threatened raid of the friends
of Lt. Gov. Smith to oust Baxter and
place Smith in the gubernatorial chair.
The grounds of Smith's friends for their
action are that Baxter's election was un-
constitutional, but it appears that he was
elected on the same ticket with Smith,
running ahead of Smith and all on the
ticket. The State House and grounds
are closely guarded. Several officials
connected with the militia have been re-
moved and their places filled by friends
of Baxter, and the latter's decided
measures of preparation to resist all
movements of the Smith faction has evi-
dently led to reconsideration on the part
of the latter. Baxter certainly will not
yield without a resort to arms.
