"THE COUNTY FAIR" THOS. MITCHELTREE
PLEASURES AT GRAND
Spectacular Prologue Adds To
Fascination of Big
Feature Film.
Two-Feature Films and Su-
perb Comedy Also On
Allen Program.

Of the many old-time, but still popu-
lar airs played last night by the
orchestra at the Grand Opera House
to the picture version of "The County
Fair" as an overture, none seemed more
in keeping than "Auld Lang Syne," and
truly did it express the idea of a re-
turn for the time being of mind and
body to the days of youth and light-
hearted happiness, when to own 25 cents
to spend on pink lemonade and popcorn
or peanuts was the height of bliss, but
when combined with a prologue includ-
ing a stage setting of the museum with
its flaring banners, spicery, jazz band,
candy vendors and crowd of country
folk of all ages gazing in wonderment
at the gaudily-dressed dancing girls,
etc., the scene attained a realism that
carried the imagination with it to a
degree seldom attained by the art of
the stage screen.
Maurice Tourneur in his picturiza-
tion of this popular Old England story
made famous on the stage by Neil Bur-
goess, has attained a remarkable suc-
cess, in which his choice of the artist
presenting the leading characters has
been most judicious. The excellent
replicas of characters that may still
be found in the untainted
countryman's hamlets, though unfortu-

The narrative throughout is of in-
terest and genuine human interest,
which grips the heart by its lively
and amusing presentation of simple love

JUBILEE OF STANFIELD'S, LIMITED.
Pioneers of Woolen Business in Canada
Celebrate Half a Century
of Success.

Stanfield's, Limited, held a five days
convention at Truro, N. S., recently, and
it came to a close with a banquet and
dinner at the hotel. The convention was
attended by the officers, business executive

organization, now the chief industry of
Truro, and one of the most important

came from his uncle's mill in Bradford,

Ever since John and Frank Stanfield
were sold to his sons, John and Frank,
who grew up in the business and are
still the active heads as president and
vice-president, respectively.
They have consistently used

goods to the Canadian people, for they
realized that no matter how good their
products might be, the quickest and
most economical method of acquainting
the people with its merits was to ad-
vertise in the newspapers. That this
has been a wise investment is proven
by the steadily increasing demand for
