District and General.

The village of Thamesville raised \$650 on French flag day.

Considerable thieving from autos is reported at Port Stanley.

A cow owned by Stanley McCutcheon, at Florence, was killed by lightning.

Mr. Finlayson of Campbellton has been engaged as principal of the Springfield public school.

Willie P. Field, a London newsboy, was drowned in the Thames on Saturday evening while bathing.

One of the most violent electric storms of the season visited Stratford and vicinity Friday afternoon.

A. McKillop of Rodney has been engaged as mathematics master for Ridgeway Collegiate Institute.

The police authorities at Sarnia have begun a war against the use of glaring headlights by motor owners of the city.

A tornado on a small scale at Thorold sucked a pond dry and into another pond tossed a horse and drowned it.

The retail price of Canadian cheese to the English consumer is 32 cents a pound while English cheese costs the consumer 41 cents a pound.

That a Dominion election will be held some time this year, possibly inside of three months, and not later than November seems an assured fact.

The Eagle Fisheries have been incorporated with a capital of \$35,000 and head offices at West Lorne. Local fishermen report good catches and a very rough lake.

Miss Bertie Watson has resigned her position as teacher in S. S. No. 7, Metcalfe, and has accepted a position as modern teacher in the Alvinston continuation school.

It was definitely announced at military headquarters London that there will be no harvest leave to enable soldiers to assist the farmers in gathering in grain this year.

Owing to the soaking of the soil by excessive rains potatoes are reported to be rotting in some localities even on high ground. Early tomatoes are also being adversely affected by excessive moisture.

Tilbury is to have a large factory for the manufacture of porcelain goods for electric supplies. It will employ a hundred hands and have a pay roll of \$80,000 yearly, exclusive of directors' salaries.

The Board of Grain Supervisors for Canada have ruled that dating from the first of August next the maximum price of wheat on the basis of No. 1 Northern will be \$1.15 per bushel. It shall not exceed \$2.40 per bushel.

Lady teachers in Windsor who decide to get married, even to a soldier, must forfeit their positions. Married teachers, according to the views of a majority of the board of education, are not as efficient as those who remain single.

Four boys, Leonard Jones, George Jones, Glen Seayne and Aubrey Marr, were struck and instantly killed by lightning at Lambeth on Sunday afternoon when they went under a bridge for shelter while bathing in Dingman's Creek.

Here is the three-course meatless wheatless menu which got a \$10 prize in Chicago.—Baked halibut, mashed potatoes garnished with parsley and lemon; liberty salad (radishes, green onions and string beans), hot corn bread, apple tapioca, oatmeal macaroons and coffee.

The Bothwell Times.—Wm. Hodge sustained a severe accident on Saturday. He was returning from cultivating corn when the horse became frightened and upset the buggy, breaking two of Mr. Hodge's ribs, and his advanced years his escape from death is considered marvellous.

As an example of the boldness of blackbirds, a Sarnia citizen reports that one of them, which had a nest in a tree close by, flew down and picked up the hat from his young son's head, flew up into the tree, where the hat became lodged in the branches, and it was necessary to climb the tree to secure the hat.

Major-General Sir Arthur W. Currie, the distinguished Canadian from Middlesex county, Ontario, was again honored by the King and made Knight Commander of St. Michael and St. George. General Currie accompanied the King and Queen of England on their recent visit to the Canadian front in France.

As a result of the high cost of leather dealers and tanners are advising people to have their shoes half-soled as a means of conserving the leather supply of the Dominion. It is said that a general half-soled of shoes would mean a saving of thousands of tons of leather annually and would make the shoes wear much longer. It is predicted that the cost of shoes will remain at high levels indefinitely. Owing to the entry of the United States into the war a further advance in the price of shoes is expected, as it will require millions of pairs to equip the American army.

A memorial service was held in the English church, Wardsville, to do loving honor to the memory of Private Atwood E. Gardiner, who was killed in action in France on June 9th. The church was crowded to its capacity and addresses were given by Revs. Hale, Malouin and Jeffries. Many were in tears as the speakers paid loving tribute to the dead hero. A beautiful wreath of flowers was given by his former schoolmates and many kind words were spoken. Pte. Gardiner, enlisted with the 91st and was only a short time in the trenches when he met his death. His brother, Earl, is now somewhere in France. They are sons of Mr. and Mrs. Duncan Gardiner, North Aldborough.

Fourteen were recommended by the teachers of the High School as being, in their judgment, ready for this ordeal. Of these only four have failed to obtain the required number of marks in all the subjects.

Would Tax All Vehicles.

All wheeled vehicles, excepting baby carriages, bicycles, wheelbarrows and toy wagons and carts, in London, Ont., will be taxed \$1 each if a bylaw which is being prepared passes the council and receives the sanction of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board. The City Council proposes to license all such vehicles and place the money derived from the fees in a special fund to be expended on the improvement of the city streets. Every driver of a vehicle will receive a license tag, which he will be required to show on demand. Automobiles are included in the list of vehicles which will have to pay the fee. All wagons, buggies, carriages, etc., will also have to secure a license.

Warning to Potato Growers

The excessive wet, cool weather during July is causing an infection to potatoes known as Potato Blight, the most injurious disease to which potatoes are subject. It affects the leaves and tubers and to a slight extent the stems. On the leaves it appears as dark-colored spots, often toward the margin of the leaves, and when the disease is active the leaves have a water-soaked appearance and on the under surface of these spots a delicate white fungus growth may be seen.

If the weather is wet these spots increase in size and run into each other and the whole leaf becomes brown, soft, rotten and droops down around the stem and has a disagreeable odour. It works with great rapidity in wet weather by means of numerous spores produced on the under surface of the diseased leaves being spread by wind and water, and some of these spores are washed down through the soil and affect the tubers, setting up a disease known as Potato Rot.

The weather conditions this year have been most favorable to the spread of this disease and unless preventive means are taken immediately it is estimated the loss in Ontario will be 15,000,000 bushels, which will mean a potato famine, and as the grain crop is not yet assured it is each potato grower's duty to act at once, for a few days' delay will be too late, as infection has already appeared in some districts.

The only measure of control is spraying with Bordeaux mixture. This is made as follows:—4 lbs. copper sulphate or bluestone, 4 lbs. quick lime or 5 1/2 lb. slaked lime, 40 gal. water. If quick lime is used, it must be slaked first, using just enough water to keep the lime moist.

Dissolve the copper sulphate in half the quantity of water and work up the lime in the other half. The two are now mixed by pouring the two solutions into the spray tank, and immediately after a rain, thorough and timely spraying will very largely control this disease and to a great extent save the potato crop.
