Woodstock Carries Industrial By-Laws

Woodstock turned out to the polls yesterday and carried the two industrial by-laws submitted, with handsome majorities, as a result, the location here of the Brunswick Canadian Products Company and the Warren Pipe Organ Company is assured.

The city voted almost solidly for the by-laws, each receiving majorities of over a thousand. The two by-laws together polled less than 200 negative votes.

The two plants will commence erecting their factories shortly, it is understood.

Horticultural Directors Met.
The Board of Directors of the Kitchener Horticultural Society held its regular monthly meeting at the home of Mrs. H. Wolfhard, 147 Queen St. South on Sat. evening, Nov. 29th.

Owing to the recent changes in the Horticultural Society Act the society year has to be changed to coincide with the calendar year, and while practically all business for the year was concluded, there will still be another meeting to present the final report and to set a date for the annual meeting which will be held early in January.

After the business of the evening the Directors spent a very pleasant social hour enjoying the many good things served by the hostess.

William Schell Dies at Norwich.
William Schell, a lifelong resident of Oxford and prominent in the municipal life of the county is dead at his home in Norwich following an illness of several months. He spent nearly all his life there and was for years warden of the county. He was vice of the township of North Norwich and a member of Oxford County Council. He was a past president of the Otter Mutual Fire Insurance Company and a member of the board of directors.

Platoon System is Referred Back.
The Stratford City Council passed a grant of \$60 to Stratford General Aid. A resolution offered by the fire committee for a two-platoon system at the firehall was referred back to committee of the whole for further information.

A resolution was passed calling on the Government to establish the hydro power commission on a permanent basis, with Sir Adam Beck as chairman for three years and the municipalities having a direct representation.

By-laws for \$50,000 for park purposes and for \$25,000 for the establishment of a soldiers' clubhouse were read and sent on to the ratepayers at the election in January.

Guelph, Dec. 1.—Sir Adam Beck it was hoped, would be present at to-night's meeting of the City Council, but he wired that he was unable to do so, having other engagements. Answer was sent to Sir Adam informing him that the report of the railways and manufacturers committee respecting the street railway, which was to have been presented to the City Council this evening would be deferred until he can be present and explain his proposition. It is probable that a special meeting of the Council will be called at a date when Sir Adam can attend.

The report of the railway and manufacturers committee recommended that a by-law be submitted to the people in January for authority to raise \$150,000 by the issuing of debentures to put the street railway in proper condition and to establish a ten minute service with new cars and to appoint A. E. Baldwin as manager at a salary of \$1,800 per year.

Cars Soon Ready Again.
The street railway cars which were damaged in the collision some weeks ago are rapidly being repaired. They will be on the line again in a few weeks.

The department is going to install electric stoves in all the cars of the line.

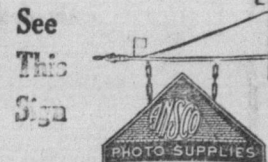
