Hamilton Secures a Five Goal Lead

O.H.A. CHAMPIONS TIGHTEN HOLD ON ALLEN CUP IN FIRST GAME, DEFEATING MANITOBA AND WESTERN TITLE HOLDERS BY 4 TO 1.

Toronto, March 18.—The Allan cup looks to be firmly lodged in the East, Selkirk, Manitoba and Western champions going down to defeat before the Hamilton Tigers O.H.A. champions, here to-night 4 to 1. This gives the Hamilton team a lead for the second game on Thursday of five goals.

Only in the first ten minutes of the game did the Westerners have a margin. Hamilton won the toss and elected to play under O.H.A. rules of three twenty-minute periods. On Thursday the two half-hour periods will be in vogue as the Western rules call for this.

The Western invaders surprised the fans with their checking and speed in the first period. They tore in like a lot of hornets and backed up the Tigers into their own quarters for the first ten minutes. Tigers were much the best in the second period. They ran down the attack two and three at a time and went around the Selkirk defense with great regularity. Tigers also shook off checkers in better style. The visitors did not have the same dash that characterized their work in the opening period. The third period provided the poorest hockey of the night. Both clubs showed the signs of the pace. Selkirk fell down on work close in to the net.

Both teams showed a little timper and illegal checking drew a host of penalties. The Tigers were the worst offenders when the Hamilton team engaged Selkirk. The fact that Hamilton won was no fault of the Western outfit. The lads from the new modern town of Selkirk which was originally a Red River settlement, were thoroughly beaten, but they are not beaten yet in spirit. The aggregation of juniors sailed into the veteran seniors from the face off and far from acknowledging defeat at any stage of the game, had the Hamiltonians on the run at the end.

Hamilton adopted body checking tactics at the commencement of the game, but were, much to their surprise quickly and fully repaid in their own currency. The whole contest bristled

with marvelous stickhandling and the Selkirk lost nothing by comparison in this respect. In the matter of speed the Westerners perhaps had a shade the better of the argument. They backed checked the Hamilton team from end to end and had the fleetness of foot to do it.

Lack only experience. That was evident from the first tangle of the referee's bell. They failed to penetrate the Hamilton defense. The Matte-Reise combination, who were playing hockey before some of the Selkirk "kids" could skate well—that is mention literally were too much of an enemy to the Manitobas. The big crowd naturally favored the O.H.A. champions to hold the Allan cup when the game commenced, but they were quite impartial after witnessing the plucky display of the challengers.

Only one goal was scored during the third period, but both goals were in danger a many times. The teams:

FORTY-FIRST YEAR

W. J. HANNA

Hon. W. J. Hanna Dead

Died Today in Florida.

WAS FORMERLY PROVINCIAL SECRETARY

TORONTO, Mar. 20.—Hon. W. J. Hanna, President of the Imperial Oil Company and former Provincial Secretary of Ontario, died today at Augusta, Ga.

DIED OF A STROKE
TORONTO, ONT., Mar. 20.—A telegram which reached this city shortly before noon today announced that Hon. W. J. Hanna, President of the Imperial Oil Co. of Canada, former Food Controller, also Provincial Secretary of Ontario, died this morning at Augusta, Ga., following a stroke.

Feeling unwell, Mr. Hanna two weeks ago went south with a party consisting of Mrs. Hanna, Dr. S. Cummings, his attending physician, his son Walter Nesbitt and C.O. Sullivan, vice-president of the Imperial Oil Co. They took up their quarters at Partridge Inn, Augusta.

Word reached Toronto today that Mr. Hanna's health was improved and the announcement of his death today came as a surprise to his friends. It is believed that the death of his only son, Lieutenant Neil Hanna, while flying in Italy last November, hastened his end.

Beside his widow two daughters survive, Mrs. H.B. Spalling of Toronto now in New York, and Miss Katharine Hanna, student at Dassar College, Poughkeepsie, New York.

The body will be brought home, to Sarnia for interment.

HANNA'S DEATH REGRETTED
TORONTO, March 20.—The province of Ontario has lost a very capable citizen in the death of Hon. W. J. Hanna, said C. M. Bowman, chief Liberal whip in the Ontario house. "During his term of office as Provincial Secretary he brought about a very businesslike system in regard to the institutions under the control of his department. Since assuming the presidency of the Imperial Oil Company, he clearly served his generation by the profit-sharing system which he put into effect."

News of the death of Hon. W. J. Hanna, former Provincial Secretary and a pillar of gloom over Queen's Park today. Members of both sides of the house also received the tidings with regret and were outspoken in their tributes to the character and ability of the deceased. Premier. Hearts declined to make any comment until the opening of the house this afternoon, when official recognition will probably be taken by the government of the passing of the former cabinet minister.

Colonel Donald Sharp, Conservative member for Welland, expressed regret at the death of Mr. Hanna, and stated that while overseas he had met Mr. Hanna's sister-in-law, Miss McAdam, who is a member of the Alberta legislature, and who was serving as a Red Cross nurse.

"He was the strongest man in the Whitney cabinet, in point of ability and strength of character," so Allen Studdholm, Labor member for East Hamilton, said. "He and I fought frequently on the floor of the house, but personally we were the best of friends. He was working toward a spirit of cooperation between employer and employee in the Imperial Oil Co., and his death will be a serious loss to the province."
