are at Liberty to act as they have a Mind to; and this makes it probable France would never have fubmitted to Terms fo difadvantagious to her Power, if the fuddenly intended the like Exercises of it, that have been practis'd fome Years before: Therefore the Reader may reasonably hope the Duration of this Peace will add to the Glory of it: he will admire the Contriver of that wonderful Machine, that made and forc'd a way for it ; he will wish the Hero a long Enjoyment of it, and this is for every English Man's own Interest; for it may be this Peace carries fomething in it refembling the Nature of Creation, its continuance may in fome meafure depend upon the Being of its Maker.
