jury this afternoon. They returned a verdict finding Mrs. Crawford guilty of adultery with Sir Charles Dilke, and granting Mr. Craw-ford a divorce. The jury was absent twenty

minutes.

The decision arrived at by the jury is that that Mr. Crawford is entitled to a divorce from Mr. his wife on the ground of adultery with Sir Charles Dilke, as decided nisi by Justice Charles Butt on February 12, the present face the present specific as the intervention of the control of the contr Charles Butt on February 12, the present case being simply a rehearing at the intervention of the Queen's proctor, for the purpose of ascertaining whether the decree his should be set aside, on the ground of collusion, or on new evidence invalidating the wife's confession. The jury finding in favor of Mr. Crawford the proceedings confirms the previous decree, and make it absolute at the expiration of the six months attaching to it. This six months will expire on August 12. The Queen's proctor has been condemned to pay the costs of the present proceedings.

In his closing argument Sir Walter Phillimore for the Queen's proctor urged the jury to believe that Mrs. Crawford's whole confession was concocted for the purpose of sheltering Capit, Foster.

Mr. Justice Hannen in summing up the tase for the jury hid stress upon Sir Charles Dilke's abstention from testifying in the former trial. This, said the judge, had the effect of suggesting that Sir Charles was guilty of the charges he refrained from denying. "Would you, gentlemen of the jury," asked the judge "remain silent even under advice of counsel when a tissue of falselfields was told against you, seriously affecting, your moral character?"

Justice Hannan's charge from beginning to end was decidedly against Sir Charles. The Judge alluded to the absence from the testimony of confirmation of the essential portions of Sir Charles Dilke's story as "certainly remarkable," while Mrs. Grawford was able to describe the bedroom in Sir Charles house in which she said he spoiled her, although he

Sir Charles to the Electors of Chelsea. ONDON, July 23.—Sir Charles Dilke has stied the following address to the Chelsea elrention of the Queen's Proctor in the case of Crawford versus Crawford, on the plea that the said divorce was pronounced contrary to the justice of the case, has led to a verdict in which the finding of Justice Butt has been affirmed. This 'decision has been come to without my being allowed to appear by counsel or to address the jury; without my being allowed to cross-examine for myself, also without my being given in advance the names of witnesses, all of which under the order of the court have been freely supplied the other side.
