a farm of one or two
acres of good quality which
remains their property and
that of their families and
descendants for ever, and
also to reserve a sufficient
additional quantity to provide
for the young men as they
become of an age to settle
upon land. Should the
Mickemikongy Indians desire
to be dealt with in the
same manner as their
brethren on the other parts
of the island, suitable
arrangements can be made
for their selecting an ample
quantity of good land
previously
