

93. DUTY OF OFFICERS IF RIOTERS DO NOT DISPERSE.—If the persons so unlawfully, riotously and tumultuously assembled together, or twelve or more of them, continue together, and do not disperse themselves, for the space of thirty minutes after the proclamation is made or after such hindrance as aforesaid, it is the duty of every such sheriff, justice and other officer, and of all persons required by them to assist, to cause such persons to be apprehended and carried before a justice.

2. INDEMNIFICATION OF OFFICERS.—If any of the persons so assembled are killed or hurt in the apprehension of such persons or in the endeavour to apprehend or disperse them, by reason of their resistance, every person ordering them to be apprehended or dispersed, and every person executing such orders, are indemnified against all proceedings of every kind in respect thereof.

3. SECTION NOT RESTRICTIVE.—Nothing in this section contained shall, in any way, limit or affect any duties or powers imposed or given by this Act as to the suppression of riots before or after the making of the said proclamation. 55-56 V., c. 29, s. 84.

94. NEGLIGENCE OF PEACE OFFICER TO SUPPRESS RIOT.—Every sheriff, deputy sheriff, mayor or other head officer, justice, or other magistrate, or other peace officer, of any county, city, town or district, who has notice that there is a riot within his jurisdiction, who, without reasonable excuse omits to do his duty in suppressing such riot, is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to two years' imprisonment. 55-56 V., c. 29, s. 140.

95. NEGLIGENCE TO AID PEACE OFFICER THEREAT.—Every one is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to one year's imprisonment who, having reasonable notice that he is required to assist any sheriff, deputy sheriff, mayor, or other head officer, justice, magistrate, or peace officer in suppressing any riot, without reasonable excuse omits to do so. 55-56 V., c. 29, s. 141.
