

brought to the Bar of this House, to receive such judgment, as in its wisdom it shall deem meet.—The petitioner has further to complain of the undue influence made use of by the said *Stephen Sewell*, Esquire, Solicitor General, to obtain his election, by employing *Edme Henry*, of the Parish of *Laprairie*, in the County aforesaid, Esquire, Agent and Collector of the Revenue of the *Seigneurie de la Prairie de la Magdelaine*, (formerly belonging to the Jesuits, but which has since escheated to the Crown); he the said *Edme Henry*, Esquire, Agent and Collector aforesaid, in opposition and in direct contravention to the usages and customs relative thereto, which obtains in the Mother Country, did openly, himself, and by his clerks and other agents, interest, engage and persuade a great number of the electors of the said County to vote and tender their suffrages in favor of the said *Stephen Sewell*, Esquire, only, and did dissuade said electors from voting for the petitioner; and did further aid, assist and direct the election of the said *Stephen Sewell*, Esquire, Solicitor General, contrary to the injunction laid on persons filling such an office, by the British Statutes.—That the petitioner having been very materially injured by the illegal and improper conduct of the said *Edme Henry*, Esquire, doth most humbly beseech the House, that it may be pleased to order the said *Edme Henry*, Esquire, to be taken into the custody of the Serjeant at Arms, and be made to appear at the Bar thereof, to receive such judgment, as in its wisdom, it shall pronounce.—The petitioner, in order the more fully to convince the House of the many illegal means employed to influence the electors of the said County of *Huntingdon*, begs leave most humbly to submit to its wise consideration, a letter, written by *Benjamin Beaubien*, Esquire, Attorney at Law, dated the first day of November last past, wherein it is expressly stated; “I again repeat to you not to give your votes to Mr. *Cuvillier*, nor to any other person but Mr. *Sewell* ;”—also a copy of a letter addressed to Mr. *Delorimier*, residing in the village of the *Sault St. Louis*, written by Lieutenant Colonel *F. Dechambaud*, wherein the writer, as well in his name, as in that of Sir *John Johnson*, directs the Indians of the *Sault St. Louis*, not to vote, but for the said *Stephen Sewell*, Esquire, only, because, in doing otherwise, the said *Stephen Sewell*, Esquire, would lose his election.—The petitioner is well aware of the indignation with which the House will view these attempts to pervert the right of electors, in making that free choice to represent them, which they have, by our
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
