

CITY NEWS

A CLEAN SHEET—

Judge Forin of Nelson was in the city yesterday for the purpose of holding supreme court chambers. As the docket was absolutely clean for the first time in many months, His Honor's duties were not onerous.

POPULATION GREATER—

The Miner is informed by one of the local census enumerators that the population of this city is greater than the figures issued by the department at Ottawa, and that a mistake must have been made in transmitting the telegram, as the actual figures for Rossland show 6,165 inhabitants instead of 6,138.

NELSON'S NUMBERS—

Nelson's population according to the census is 4,610. That is the number of people within the corporation limits, and the Nelson papers are figuring that the inhabitants of Bogusnow and other suburbs should be counted in, which would give the city a population of about 5,600.

WEDDED AT COAST—

A Victoria exchange says: "Miss Mary McLaren Garrow, of Toronto, and William Brown, of H. M. customs, Rossland, having visited Victoria for the first time last Saturday, rendered the occasion memorable by entering the bonds of matrimony. The nuptial tie was performed by Rev. A. Fraser. The happy couple intend visiting the coast cities on their homeward trip."

A FORECAST—

An old resident of Rossland in discussing the weather conditions yesterday remarked that the summer drawing to a close reminded him strongly of the summer and fall of 1894. In that year no snow fell until December 24, and the winter was thus shortened. He expects something of the same nature to be the case this year, judging from the conditions up to date.

INSPECTION IN OCTOBER—

A despatch from Victoria to the Miner last night announced that Lieut-Colonel Holmes, D.O.C., would inspect the Rossland company, Rocky Mountain Range, on October 9. The Nelson company will be inspected on October 11. Kaslo and Kamloops on the 13th. The local company will be in fine form for the ordeal by the date specified.

WILL BUILD GREATER—

A contractor commenced work yesterday on the demolition of the block adjoining the Allan House, owned by Dr. MacKenzie. The doctor has concluded to raze the building and erect on the site a two or three story brick block. The plans adopted for the present call for a two-story block, to be complete and modern in every respect, at a cost of \$7,500. Work on the new premises will be started in September.

EASTWARD BOUND—

Major A. M. Reynolds, Royal Engineers, is in the city on his way to London, England, after six years' foreign service. The Major was stationed in India for a number of years, and was one of the British officers detached from the Indian army last year for service in China. He arrived in the Orient in September last, just after the stirring scenes in the campaign against the Boxers had been enacted. Recently he was ordered home on furlough and is now en route to the Old Country.

SPORTING PARADISE—

The party of Rosslanders who spent a fortnight on Goat River have returned to the city. The entire party included Henry Ewert, James Jordan and Robert Strong of Rossland, Postmaster Frank Brown of Trail and W. R. Steele of Nelson. They located camp some distance back of Kitchener and enjoyed the vacation immensely. Mr. Ewert informs the Miner that the Goat River country is a veritable sportsmen's paradise, game of every description abundant. The party brought back several hundred fine trout.

SWIMMING MUST CEASE—

The privilege granted for swimming in the Black Bear pond has been revoked for the reason that the privilege has been abused by grown persons. When the respondents for the Black Bear pond it was for the benefit of the young men of the city who would otherwise be denied a privilege highly valued by all young men. The license was abused by older men, who should have known better, and ultimately the practice became the most objectionable. Complaints were made of indecent exhibitions by bathers, and it was reluctantly determined to put an end to bathing in the pond. This order takes effect at once.

A good story is going the rounds at the expense of a Boundary man whose name is not essential to the point of the yarn. The gentleman in question is the owner of a good sized block of Spitzee stock, and as he has been working in the hills for several months has quite unreasonably placed on an entirely new basis. A few days ago he came into a Boundary town and picked up a copy of the Miner with the stock quotations. Running his eye down the list he was surprised and delighted beyond measure to note that Spitzee shares were at \$5 asked and \$5.50 bid. He could scarcely believe his good fortune, but another glance assured him that the figures were right. Thereupon he commenced to figure his profits on the shares and decided that there was ample margin for a celebration. The idea was put into effect without delay, and for two days the jubilation lasted without a break. The blow fell when the stockholder found that his shares were about one-fifth the value of the shares quoted at \$5.

The funeral takes place on Monday at 2:30 from the residence of the parents, Le Roi avenue, and will be conducted by Rev. C. W. Hedley, rector of St. George's church.

SIGNS OF THE TIMES

CONFIDENCE FOLLOWS RESUMPTION OF WORK ON THE HILL.

BUSINESS DEVELOPMENTS THAT WAITED ON THE NEW CONDITIONS.

The Clinton bar opened for business on Thursday night and was running full swing last night. The familiar old sign "Miners' Checks Cashed" was dusted off and placed in a prominent place behind the long oak counter. The Clinton was closed down soon after the strike started and the proprietor announced that he would not re-open until things took a turn. Now the saloon is running again. Things have taken the turn that the proprietor expected and miners can have their checks cashed there on the 15th of September when the first pay roll will be distributed. Most Rossland people know that it is a long time since Harry Jones put his money on the wrong horse.

The Headquarters saloon is to be reopened within the next few days. Charles O. Telbot has taken a lease on the premises and the place is now being renovated within and without. The opening will be announced shortly. As long as the strike was a prominent figure in the local situation saloons were not being opened. It is funny to note how the hotel market size up matters and are keen to put their good money into propositions when industrial conditions take a turn for the better. The Headquarters will be in shape to do business with the miners when the first pay roll is distributed on September 15. The Windsor hotel fixtures and good will were sold by auction yesterday and realized a figure that would have been regarded as ridiculously high if Rossland was to remain under the cloud of industrial depression. The purchaser knew that the big monthly pay roll was again looming up on the horizon and got a bargain. Without the pay roll the Windsor and every other hotel and saloon business would be a good money loser, but the people in the business and those embarking or re-embarking on once and have backed their judgment. They will win.

A few weeks ago the block adjoining the Hotel Allan was burned. It could have been repaired at a cost of a few hundred dollars but if Rossland was to remain as it was when the fire occurred the owner might better have left the premises as they stood for a tenant would have been as hard to find as the eye teeth in a chicken. But the owner did not leave the building as it was, nor did he patch it up as he might have done. He let a contract a day or two ago for the demolition of the building and will erect on the site a \$7,500 brick block. He knew that the pay roll that is Rossland's back bone would be at its old substantial proportions long before his new block could be completed, and proposed to reap the full benefit at the earliest possible date. The owner will be a little behind the pace, however, for the next pay roll will be distributed on September 15, just two weeks hence.

Fully a month ago the Beally block occupied by a millinery store was scorched by fire. The owner of the building didn't do anything to repair the damage for some weeks. It wasn't necessary to rush the repairs for tenants were not pressing for vacant stores at that juncture. A few days ago things began to wear a new aspect and the owner of the block made haste to have the building put in good order. He knew that the old time pay day would shortly be an accomplished fact again and did not want to lose a possible tenant because of his building being out of repair. That's why several hundred dollars were put into improvements, and the investment will be well repaid, for Rossland is on the threshold of better times than it has seen in many moons, the Miner's Union to the contrary notwithstanding.

The moral of all this is that the strike has ceased to be a thorn in the side of business men and property owners. They are satisfied that the big mines will be working at full capacity in less time than many people imagine to be possible and want to have their business arranged so that none of the fruits of prosperity and peace will go unreaped.

LOOKING TO A DEAL IRON MASK CLOSED

STANDARD PYRITIC COMPANY'S BUSINESS MAY CHANGE HANDS.

MR. SPRINGER AND HIS ASSOCIATES CONTEMPLATE PURCHASE.

While in this city yesterday W. L. Springer, of Chicago, president of the Chicago-British Columbia Mining company, stated that the principals of his company had taken an option on the plant and other assets of the Standard Pyritic Mining and Smelting company of Boundary Falls, near Greenwood. The option covered the control of the company, now held by Mr. Price, the Quebec millionaire lumber merchant. In addition to the smelter, the property covered by the option includes the Standard and Marguerite mines, both of which are valuable properties and will become extensive producers within a comparatively short time. The Marguerite adjoins the Mother Lode, and the glory hole from which the bulk of the Mother Lode ore is being extracted heads direct for Marguerite ground.

Mr. Springer stated that the deal was not closed, but that with his colleagues he was very favorably impressed with the prospect for a successful enterprise. On arriving at Chicago the matter would be gone into further, and he believed that a sale would be arranged at an early date. The option now stands in the name of a Greenwood man, but Mr. Springer was reticent as to the consideration and other particulars of the proposition.

The Chicago-British Columbia company owns at the present time a very promising group of claims in the Skyline camp, near Greenwood. An excellent showing has been developed, and the company has recently installed a steam plant, and with the facilities thus rendered available the development of the group will be pushed ahead.

When leaving Rossland yesterday, Mr. Springer remarked that he expected to pass through the city again at an early date, presumably on the completion of the smelter deal.

J. J. HILL ON SPECULATION. The Railway Magnate Says There is no Substitute for Hard Work.

James J. Hill is not given to magazine writing. Probably the most fascinating figure in the American financial world is silent to grime. His remarkable article in the current Saturday Evening Post will therefore be read with absorbing interest. It is characteristic of the writer: There is no substitute for hard work in winning success. There is always an element of chance, but it is never the predominant element. Chance simply presents an opportunity and opportunity is merely a vehicle for human endeavor. The man, young or old, who thinks otherwise, who believes that it is luck alone that makes riches, and ill-luck that keeps men poor, starts out with a false notion. It is inevitable that he should come to grief in the scheme of life. The great success of the man who grows largely out of the conviction that success is luck. Such a craze is more injurious to the prospects of young men who are carried away by it than war or pestilence. It means not alone the loss of money, but the ruin of the character. It leaves the man standing on a false platform where they are contented for nothing, and lose all appetite for hard work. It unfits them for sincere effort, and almost without exception produces a demoralization that blights their entire existence. Whether the young man who makes his first speculative ventures wins or loses the result is equally bad.

If there is any difference at all it is in favor of the man who comes out a loser in his first venture. With him at least there is a chance that he will wake up to the hopelessness of speculation, and that a means of acquiring wealth, and that the lesson taught will result in leaving him a useful working member of society, instead of a drunk who thinks that he may get along by dipping into the honey-pots of others. Now and then men arise who happen to make a success of speculation, who make something out of nothing. They are so rare that the entire list may be checked off on the fingers of two hands. Unfortunately they are taken as fair examples, instead of extraordinary exceptions. Their names and fame are paraded in the public prints and the public mind is inflamed by chronicles of their successful ventures. That they stand as survivors of a system that has wrecked thousands and hundreds of thousands is not taken into account. The unfortunates who have gone down to ruin and beggary are never heard of. They are not interesting and their history never finds the light of day except where, here and there, one more desperate than the rest puts and end to his existence under sensational circumstances.

WORK IS SUSPENDED UNTIL LABOR TROUBLES ARE SETTLED.

MR. CORBIN SPEAKS OF VISIT TO THE KING SOLOMON MINE.

"The Iron Mask management has decided to close down until the labor question is definitely settled. In the meantime it will consider the question of sinking a working shaft inasmuch as the cost of extracting the ore can thereby be saved." The foregoing statement was made yesterday afternoon by D. C. Corbin, of Spokane, who, as is well known, is one of the principal shareholders in the Iron Mask. The shut-down takes effect this morning. The facts in connection with the closing down of the Iron Mask are just as Mr. Corbin puts them. Economy can be gained in the operation of the property by putting in a working shaft with the other improvements to the property that necessarily attend such an undertaking. The company has no assurance that it would be possible to make contracts for the shaft, or that if on tracts were made the men would adhere to the agreement. Until matters are in such shape that the proposed work can be carried out quickly and properly it is deemed advisable to permit the enterprise to stand. In the meantime the company has concluded not to take out ore by the present method, which means to them a loss of several dollars per ton, hence the shut-down pending the commencement of the work of improving the working facilities in the mine.

Mr. Corbin has recently returned from an inspection of his property in the Summit camp, the King Solomon. Work has been under way on the property for the past month at least, and an excellent showing has been obtained. Mr. Corbin is noted for his conservatism in discussing mining matters, and when he says that he "believes the King Solomon will make a mine," it means that he is confident of the fact. While on the ground Mr. Corbin sampled the ore in various places, and the assays ran from 10 per cent to 30 per cent copper. Several hundred tons of it are on the dumps, and with the amount in sight and readily obtainable for shipping, the aggregate runs into four figures. It is proposed to get out a trial shipment at once, a contract having been arranged with the B. C. smelter.

THE ABLE LINCOLN. The work on the Able Lincoln is getting under way nicely. The extensive repairs to the wagon road have been completed, and the timbering of the shaft is now in progress. The shaft will be timbered from the waterline to the surface and the proper headworks put up. Then the balance of the shaft will be unwatred, the timbering completed and the programme of actual development work continued on such lines as may be determined upon. Mr. Krumpholtz, the superintendent, is now at the property daily.

RAMBLER DIVIDEND. Official notices were received yesterday of the payment of the Rambler-Cariboo dividend. This is the sixth dividend in the history of the property, and is payable on October 30 on all shares of stock registered by October 25.

THE PRIMROSE. Judge Miller of this city is now in the Lardeau. A trial shipment of ore is being made from the Primrose mine for the purpose of securing a smelter test of the ore.

THE BIG FOUR. The report from the Big Four mine last week was to the effect that the work was progressing as usual, and that some good copper ore had been encountered in the drift.
