Murray, her skipper, often came here in the "Tritonia," which was lost by striking a mine some months ago in the English Channel.

The work of effecting repairs to the Parker and Monroe building, damaged by fire on Sunday last is now under way. The damage done to building and stock is surprising, and the place must get very extensive repairs.

The crew of the schr. "Meteor" owned by Burke's, of St. Jacques, and which was lost recently off the Gaspé coast, are coming from Sydney and will arrive by to-morrow's express. The vessel had a part cargo of fish and was to finish loading for Gloucester at Gaspé, when she was lost in the recent stormy weather.

A Splendid Ship

The big ship Neath which already has taken a load of pit props across is once again North to load pit props for England. Mr. Jas. Black, Lloyd's surveyor here showed us a photo of the vessel to-day and she certainly is a beauty. She was at Cardif when war broke out and was interned there. She was launched in Genoa many in 1906, as the photo shows, and she is a very pretty vessel. She carries square yards on four of her masts, and the 5th is fitted with a mainsail and staytail, and running under full canvas she presents a splendid spectacle. She has a steam engine of great power on board and shows a funnel like any other steamer. She can take 8000 tons of cargo and is the largest vessel of her class afloat.

Record Banking Voyage

The banker "Donald G." the famous Tom Hollett skipper, of Burin, arrived in port this morning from Batteau, Labrador, where she fished the past four weeks and secured 40 qtls. The vessel has 4,800 qtls for 10 dories, the biggest voyage ever yet recorded for a Newfoundland Banker. She will go, after refitting here, to the Virgins where she will fish for some weeks, and the captain is sure of rounding out the 5,000 qtls if not 5,500 qtls for the year.

In the big storm of Monday week the vessel was out in it all reaching off Cabot Island, broke her main boom, and had some of her canvas torn. She found fish scarce and 9 other bankers, three are not doing well.

The "Tug Boat" Government

A few years ago when the Government went in for the manufacture of kindling wood, made from the trees cut down opposite the Colonial building, they were dubbed "The Split Government." They now seem to deserve the title of the "Tug Boat Government."

A few days ago their greyhound, that fast mail boat "Cabot" towed a vessel to St. John's from Placentia Bay, thereby competing with the Tug Co., and Morris, Cashin and Crossie are the leaders of the "Peoples (?) Party." What representatives of the peoples interests they are to be sure.

"Wet" and "Dry"

Winnipeg Tribune. — Portage la Prairie has been under local option for a little over three months. The Review editor has gathered some information for his readers as to police court records for the three "wet" months of 1914, and the corresponding three "dry" months of 1915, and in the matter of prosecutions of drunks and disorderlies and showing is as follows:—

1914	1915.
June—23	June—5
July—23	July—1
Aug.—29	Aug.—3

In July, 1914, there were also a case of driving an automobile whilst intoxicated. In June, 1915, there was one case of bringing liquor into local option territory; in July one case, and in August three cases. In July, 1915 there was one case of supplying liquor to an interdict. The figures are clearly in favor of the "dry." Prohibition does seem to have lessened the number of drunks and disorderlies in Portage la Prairie.

TREATING TO BE PROHIBITED

London, Sept. 28.—Greater London is to be scheduled as a munition area. The Central Control Board, within the next fortnight, will issue regulations prohibiting "treating" at any kind of public-houses or clubs. The sale of whiskey, brandy and rum, unless reduced to a number of degrees under proof, which falls between 25 and 35, will be illegal.

Saved by a Shell

A remarkable story of a German Jack Johnson shell saving a British soldier's life was given by an officer in a nursing home. He said that one day a Jack Johnson exploded in the no man land between the trenches, and suddenly a Highland soldier or rather the spectre of a Highland soldier, arose and reeled toward the British lines and fell over the parapet into the trench. Everyone was astonished, for the man's regiment had not been in that part of the trench. The man had his arm shattered and was in terrible condition. Later it was discovered from what he said, that he had been wounded and stunned by a shell five days before, and that had lain unconscious all that time till the explosion of the Jack Johnson brought him back to consciousness and by some miracle he had taken the right direction and reached a British trench. He did not die, and thus his life was really saved by the Jack Johnson.
