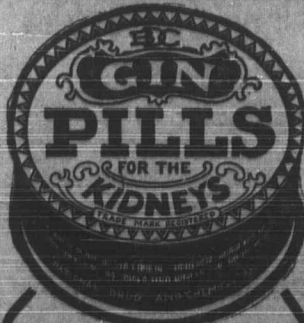
Nova Scotia's Wealth For 1919

Our Popular President

Lieutenant-Colonel J. W. Margeson, K. C., President of the the Ottawa command of the Great War Veteran's Association has been and is, one of the most strenuous workers in behalf of returned soldiers in the Dominion.

Colonel Margeson's appointment as Pension Commissioner was an exceptionally popular one and his ability and experience thoroughly fit him for discharging the onerous duties of that office.

Formerly a member of the Law firm of McLean and Margeson of Bridgewater, Nova Scotia, Colonel Margeson was gazetted a K. C. last year. He is a graduate of Acadia College and Dalhousie University, and is regarded as one of the most brilliant barristers in the Maritime Provinces.

Colonel Margeson enlisted in December 1914 with the 25th Battalion, and went to France with that famous flying unit. In 1916 he was recalled to Canada by the Minister of Militia for the purpose of assisting the Inspection of Pay and Record Services.

Becoming Inspector of Pay Account and Records of M. D. 2, at Toronto the largest military district in Canada in 1917 at the request of the military authorities he organized the Pay and Allowance Board, where, in the year 1918, decisions were given in over 91,000 cases.

Colonel Margeson is a member of the National Executive of the Canadian Patriotic Fund, and ably represented the Ottawa Command of the G. W. V. A. at the recent Dominion Convention in Vancouver. His recognized ability, and the vast amount of experience he has gained in coping with war problems, augurs well for a future which will serve to add further laurels to his already brilliant and praiseworthy record.—Billets, Ottawa.

The Storage of Ice for Summer Use

The storage of a few blocks of ice for summer use is a very simple matter where the ice is readily available. Any unoccupied corner of a shed will serve for the purpose. A rough board enclosure 10 feet square and 8 feet high will hold enough ice to provide 50 pounds per day for 130 days, after allowing for a reasonable amount of wastage. The smaller the quantity stored, the larger is the proportion of waste.

The bottom of the enclosure should be covered with about 1 foot of sawdust. If the soil underneath is impervious clay it will be all the better if there is a few inches of gravel under the sawdust. In putting in the ice the boards can be taken away from one side and replaced after the ice is in position. A space of 1 foot should be left between the ice and the boards to be filled with sawdust, and the ice should be covered with about the same thickness.

It is the sawdust which keeps the ice from melting. The drier the sawdust is the better the ice will keep, and it is a good plan, as the ice is removed during the summer, to throw out from time to time the driest of the sawdust where it will be under cover and continue to dry out and thus be in better condition to be used again the following year. The ice should be cut in blocks of uniform size and packed as closely together as possible.

cial icehouse the roughest kind of a shed that will keep out the weather is all that is necessary. Poles may be driven into the ground and lined up on the inside with rough lumber, or slabs, leaving a space of about one-half inch between each board, and the whole covered with a roof to keep out the rain. Of course, the icehouse may be built with a regular frame, lined inside with rough lumber and, if a more finished appearance is desired, it can be covered on the outside with clapboards or other siding. There should be plenty of ventilation above the ice. The same procedure should be followed in storing the ice and covering it with sawdust as advised in the preceding paragraph.

If sawdust cannot be obtained, planer mill shavings may be used for packing the ice, or in cases where neither is available hay may be used as a packing or covering material.

Marsh or "slough" hay or any fine wild hay which grows in low places gives the best results. If hay is used, the space around the ice or between the ice and the walls instead of being only 1 foot, should be at least 2 feet, into which the hay must be well packed. The ice should also be covered with about 2 feet of the hay.
