THE EXHIBITION

The Nanaimo Agricultural Show, the first for four years will be formally opened this afternoon by the Hon. Wm. Sloan, Minister of Mines. It is hardly necessary to bespeak public support for the exhibition. In previous years the shows have always been fairly successful, and coming after a lapse of four years, there should be more than usual interest and curiosity in the exhibits tabled in the exhibition building. The society has held together in the face of a good deal of discouragement and now it can see a clearer and a brighter future. From a preliminary look round the building we would say that this year's show will uphold the reputation of the society for quality of exhibits but the quantity could very well be increased. The Daughters of the Empire will have a stall, and a feature this year will be automobile exhibits. There will, indeed, be enough and to spare of attractions for the public, and it is to be hoped that the attendance during the three days of the exhibition will better expectations.

SIR WILFRID'S LEAD

Sir Wilfrid Laurier is making it particularly hard for his western followers to support him as even a possible leader of a Canadian government. He is definitely and emphatically opposed to conscription. He has taken his stand with his fellow countrymen of Quebec and it is only stating a fact to say that Quebec, where it has not been opposed to Canada's participation in the war, has been utterly indifferent to the part she played in it. So far as Quebec is concerned it would prefer to see Canada quit the war tomorrow, and so far as we have been able to see Sir Wilfrid Laurier has done nothing to alter that attitude. The crisis was reached when Sir Wilfrid and his followers refused to vote an extension of time to the present government. With the result of this step, most impartial men and women who realised that the only issue before Canada was the war, were very well satisfied. The government was not equal to the task which had devolved upon it. What was and is needed is a national government, with no politics in it, but united on a win-the-war policy. The Borden

government had failed for the reason that it was a party government composed of party politicians. There has never been any reason to think that a Laurier government composed of Liberal politicians could have done any better. A coalition Cabinet could have been formed very easily, and a general election averted. But again politics came in, and the result is that all efforts to form a union government have failed. The men directing the Liberal political machine thought they saw a chance of winning a party victory, and this counted infinitely more with them than helping to secure a victory over the Huns. There were likewise men associated with the Conservative party machine who did not like the idea of giving away anything, and so the game has gone on until thousands of Canadian citizens are sick of the name of politics. All the same there is to be an election, and it is just as well to be clear as to the issues involved. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has lined up with Quebec, and is opposed to conscription. If he is returned to power there will be no conscription. He has protested the disfranchisement of men of German and Austrian descent whose sympathies are naturally with the enemy. Thousands of Canadians have made the supreme sacrifice for their country but the cause for which they laid down their lives has yet to be won. Sir Wilfrid would have aliens in this country, whose sympathies are with the Huns vote on the issue for which these loyal Canadians have laid down their lives. There are thousands more Canadians who, from the very nature of their services, will be unable to vote, but Sir Wilfrid would have Germans in this country cast a vote. The soldier vote does not concern him, for obvious reasons; the alien vote does and for the same reasons. He will be a brave politician who will follow Sir Wilfrid's lead on this alien question out in the western provinces.

WILL REJUVENATE THE BROOKLYN CLUB

The blow that recently struck Chief Meyers and Mike Mowrey, separating them from the famous Ebbets payroll in Brooklyn, is only the beginning of a drive along the entire front, persons close to Ebbets and Wilbert Robinson declare. Robby, ably assisted by Bill Dahlen and Nap Rucker, is scouring the bushes. He is buying everything from a bat boy to a pseudo manager, and the Dodgers are not, in the future, going to be made up of a lot of slow-foots, whose only claim to big leaguering is an ability to paste the daylight out of the ball. Already the results are being tried out with varying success.

The acquisition of Pitcher Leon Cadore and Infielder O'Rourke already has had an effect on the Dodgers. The release of Wheeler Dell made a hole for Cadore, and the release of Mowrey moved up a spot for O'Rourke. Recently John McGraw decided he didn't need Ernie Krueger and released him to the Dodgers, so Chief Meyers had to get out of the way.

The policy of the Brooklyn club in times past has been to gather in just as many men who could drive a baseball out of the park as the law would allow. Of course, the value of a good pitcher was appreciated, but before Wilbert Robinson became manager of the Brooklyn team pitchers were a secondary consideration with Brooklyn managers. And that's what was willed to Robby in the way of playing talent.

The ability of Robinson to develop pitchers won him a pennant for he already had the hitters, but it is a noteworthy fact that the Dodgers on the bases at times looked like they were tied. Bunched hits in an inning that would have meant many, many runs to any other big league club, meant but little to the Dodgers. They had to have a superabundance of base hits before they could score their runs. That's been their main trouble this year, for the heavy

maulers have not been doing the amount of mauling they did a year ago. Retaining the heaviest artillery Robinson is beginning to put more speed into his team. The youth and pep will field just as well and hit pretty near the veteran's mark.

NEW YORK POLICE FOUND BOMB MAKING PLANT

HERMAN, EXEMPT FROM ARMY, TO DEFEND TITLE

New Orleans, Sept. 11.—Pete Herman, claimant of the world's bantamweight pugilistic championship, today was granted exemption from the army draft until October 15 by defense his title. Herman had claimed exemption from service in the national army on the ground of dependent parents. He stated he had several fights pending which would bring him sufficient money to provide for his parents and the board decided to give him until October 15 to join the army. Herman's manager stated he had bouts arranged with Johnny Eggers of New York, and Frankie Burns of New Jersey.
