

## Firemen at Amherst Make Fine Showing

Delegations from Many New Brunswick Towns Take Part in One of the Finest Parades Ever Held in the Provinces—Moncton Band Takes First Prize in Competition.

Amherst, N. S., July 12.—When Amherst undertakes any work it never does it by halves. The Old Home Week celebration was a case in point. Since early dawn Monday morning everything has been going with a swing and the visitors to town are simply carried away with amazement at the elaborate programme of entertainment prepared for them and so far carried out without a hitch. A careful estimate shows that today there were in Amherst one thousand of the absent sons and daughters of Cumberland whose homes are now in the United States and Canada. In addition to these there are several thousand drawn in by the attractions from the country side and from the other towns and cities of the Maritime Provinces. There are seven bands playing in different parts of town tonight and the whole population is attending the open air concert or other forms of entertainment provided.

**Firemen Celebrate.**  
Today the third day of Old Home Week celebration was Firemen's Day and the fire ladders certainly did their share in making the day a success. The procession this morning was one of the best ever held in the province, both in the point of numbers and the appearance of the men. The handsomely decorated apparatus of the local departments added much to the appearance of the parade. The procession left the winter fair building at 11.15 and proceeded up Agnew in the following order: Mounted Marshall, D. A. Morrison; Sackville Cornet Band, Truro Firemen, Halifax officers in carriages; Halifax Firemen, 93rd Regiment Band, Fredericton Department, Moncton Band, C. R. Fire Department, Moncton, Pilgrim Band, Oxford Fire Department, Sackville Citizens Band, Sackville Fire Department, proceeded by chief in carriage, Robb Engineering Company's Fire Department, with decorated hose reel, officers in carriage, Smart's Minstrel Band, Rhodes Curry Company's Fire Department with decorated hose reel, Bell in carriage, containing Deputy Chief N. ## BAPTIST AID TO FIRE SUFFERERS

Practical Sympathy Manifest at Annual Meeting of Association at Sussex

Sussex, July 12.—At the United Baptist convention today reference was made to the great loss sustained by the church at Campbellton. It was moved by the Hon. Geo. E. Foster that a committee of five be appointed to consider the whole situation and report to association at once. The following were appointed: Hon. Geo. E. Foster, C. D. Clarke, J. W. Keirstead, Rev. W. R. Robinson and Dr. W. E. McIntyre. At the afternoon session practical sympathy was expressed in a resolution submitted on behalf of his committee by the Hon. George E. Foster. It read as follows: "That this association express its most cordial sympathy with the United Baptist church and pastor at Campbellton in their sudden and serious affliction by fire. That a special individual money contribution be sent forthwith to the pastor, Rev. S. W. Schurman, to assist him personally in the present distressing circumstances. That this association pledge its co-operation financially with the members and adherents of the Campbellton church with a view to retaining the services of their pastor during the present crisis and replacing the lost church edifice. That to this end a committee be appointed by the association to ascertain the measure of co-operation and assistance which is required and to take steps to ensure the same. That this association recommend that each church within its jurisdiction be asked to exercise its Christian charity and generous instincts by at once collecting as each deems best a substantial offering for the purpose above mentioned. That these collections will be forwarded to the treasurer of the committee whose name will be made known at once to all the churches. That this committee consist of D. C. Clark, J. W. Keirstead, W. C. Crossland, Charles E. Vall, A. A. Wilson, H. Colby Smith, R. C. Elkin, C. P. Baker and Rev. W. R. Robinson, with power to add to their number. This report was unanimously adopted.

**Bible Training Review.**  
Another very interesting feature of the afternoon session was a recital by a class of four girls which was conducted by the Rev. R. M. Bynon. It showed most careful training and revealed a surprising acquaintance with the Word. These young ladies were questioned on a great variety of subjects and answered without a moment's hesitation by quotations from the Bible, which were in every instance given with the exact reference. These lessons were from the Baptist supplementary work, prepared by the Rev. R. M. Bynon. The Bible training work done by Brother Bynon was heartily endorsed by the association and vote of thanks accorded him. The church was densely crowded for the platform meeting this evening. Addresses were given on the following subjects: "Socialism in the New Testament," Rev. H. T. Cousins, of Newcastle; "Education," Rev. Geo. Cutten, Ph. D., President of Acadia University and "Temperance," Rev. Joseph McLeod, D. D., St. John.

## THE STATEMENT ON WHITLOCK ASSETS

Total Assets of St. Stephen Man Will Exceed Liabilities by Nearly \$50,000

St. Stephen, N. B., July 13.—The inspectors appointed by the creditors of J. T. Whitlock, late cashier of the St. Stephen's Bank, have prepared the following statement of his affairs with the bank.

**Liabilities.**  
Notes made by him for his own benefit \$60,590.56.  
Other notes made by him as collateral \$13,898.50.  
Joint notes in which his name is one of many for money largely used by others, \$63,387.50.  
Notes on which he is one of many endorsers, \$200,766.77.  
Total liability direct and indirect, \$344,447.2.

The above notes are held by various persons and banks and are secured by collaterals, which at the time were marketable. A large amount of the discounts with the St. Stephen's Bank will be paid by other endorsers or from collateral security. The total assets consisting of stocks, bonds and real estate, have a par value of \$391,146.20. Owing to the nature of these it will take time to realize on many of them.

Mr. Whitlock has taken some exception to a previously published statement which placed his liability to the bank at \$172,000. The statement above makes a division of a total liability to the bank much in excess of that figure.

## BRITISH SHIP OWNERS UPSET

Recent Canadian Legislation Dealing With Water Carriage of Goods Worries Them

Liverpool, July 12.—Shipowners' associations through this country are declared by the Liverpool Journal of Commerce to be perturbed over the recent shipping legislation enacted in Canada dealing with the water carriage of goods.

The new measure which to a large extent follows on the lines of what is known as the Harter Act, applies to ships carrying goods from any port in Canada to any other port in Canada, or from any port in Canada to any port in the United Kingdom.

The Shipping Gazette points out that if the owner of a ship exercises due diligence to make his ship in all respects seaworthy and properly equipped, neither ship nor owner, agent or charterer shall become responsible for loss or damage resulting from errors of navigation or from any latent defect.

**CONNOLLY WAS SENT UP FOR TRIAL**  
Albion, July 12.—The preliminary examination of Thomas Connolly was finished today before Police Magistrate Peck of Hopedale. The prisoner was committed for trial on the charge of murder.

Mr. Fowler, counsel for the defence, asked the magistrate to call a witness for the crown, Colby Mills. Mr. Haulington objected, and the magistrate sustained the objection.

The prisoner was sent up for trial to the superior court which opens on the first Tuesday of September, with Judge Landry presiding.

Mr. Fowler asked the magistrate to furnish him with a copy of the evidence, in order that he might make application to the supreme court for bail for the prisoner. The magistrate said he would comply with this request.

Mr. Fowler will seek bail for the prisoner, who in the meantime has been committed to jail.
