Milking Thrice Daily

From the experiments of dairy farmers, especially those conducting tests in the Record of Performance and Record of Merit, it would appear that high producing cows can be induced to give more milk in three milkings than if milked twice in the twenty-four hours. As far as could be ascertained, the Experiment Stations have not put this method to an exhaustive test, but at certain times it is profitable to milk three times daily. At MacDonald College it is considered by Professor Barton that it is profitable from the standpoint of economy and safety that a cow giving 60 lbs. of milk or more a day should be milked three times. At the Nova Scotia Agricultural College five different cows were milked three times daily for one month and then dropped to twice daily the succeeding month. The reduction in the amount of milk was found to be not much greater than was to be expected as a normal drop due to the advanced period of lactation. The cows had been milked from two to three months when the test was commenced. At the Nova Scotia station, Professor Trueman pointed out that the cow Emma of Evergreen 2nd milked twice a day gave as high as 17,000 lbs during the year. Professor Trueman concludes that unless the udder is over distended there is little or no advantage in milking oftener than twice daily. Professor Trueman agrees with Professor Barton in concluding that it is advantageous to milk three times a day cows that are giving upwards of 60 lbs of milk.

NEW PROFESSOR IS AT THE U. N. B.

Fredericton, N. B., Oct. 2.—Dr. Edward Elias, B. A. Harvard, M. A. Chicago, P. H. D. Harvard, has been appointed to the chair of Modern Languages at the University of New Brunswick in succession of Dr. J. A. Spaulding. Dr. Elias has taken up his duties. He is strongly in favor of adding the study of Spanish to the curriculum on account of the growing interest in Spanish-American countries and the increasing trade with them. Prof. P. Colomb of Paris, France, originally appointed to succeed Dr. Spaulding, was unable to accept the appointment on account of illness.

A. E. F. Hero Laid Away With Honors

The late William O. Gordon was a son of Mrs. Orrin Gordon, nee Miss Chambers of Halcumb, Northumberland County, N. B. who left this county about 45 years ago, and is well remembered by a number of residents here.

A white wooden cross, first made to mark the place where a soldier boy slept in Flanders field, continued its watch today over a mound in the village cemetery at Salem, N. H., where a former member of the 77th Division of Argonne fame, was laid to his final rest.

The mound is that of the last resting place of William O. Gordon, son of Mr. and Mrs. Orrin Gordon of Church avenue, Salem, N. H., formerly of this city, whose body was laid away in the family lot in Pine Grove cemetery Sunday afternoon with full military honors. It was the first body of an American hero to arrive in this section for final interment.

Sad and impressive were the final rites which preceded the burial. In the Pleasant street Methodist Episcopal church, where today a golden star decorates the service flag which hangs in tribute to the church members who offered their all in sacrifice to a great and noble cause, the last prayers were read in the presence of a gathering of former service men and throngs of relatives and friends.

As the body was being conveyed up the church aisle, Foss' Band played "Abide With Me," following a quartet sang "Lead Kindly Light." Pastor, Rev. J. W. Clutter, assisted by Rev. Donald H. Gerrish, pastor of the Central M. E. church in this city, read the Scripture, followed by prayer by Rev. Mr. Clutter. The eulogy was delivered by Rev. Mr. Gerrish.

The latter spoke of the dead boy, who went across the sea to fight, of his participation in the big battles, and of his subsequent sacrifice, the supreme, the greatest, all for the country that he loved. It was a touching eulogy. Relatives and friends wept, here and there a service man with bowed head again accepted the lesson, one never new, but a grim reminder of the past, never to be forgotten. At the conclusion of the quartet, which was composed of Herbert Marshall, Mrs. Marjorie Kene, Miss Gertrude Kimball and Edger J. Masor, sang "Abide With Me." Mrs. Kene then sang "Red and White Roses." Miss Lillian Hall was organist.

From the church the cortege proceeded to the cemetery. Foss 16th Regiment, M.S.G., band led the procession, which wormed its way through the principal streets of the town to the last resting place. There it was consigned to earth in the family lot, while a squad fired three volleys and taps were sounded by a bugler. The squad included Richard Bodwell, George Harris, Harold Bradley, Harold Healey, John Portier, Walter Moore, Arthur Woodbury, Peter Sullivan, Donald Bignell and Si-moon Cronk. Just before the body was lowered into the grave services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Gerrish and the Salem post of the American Legion, Albert Howard, chaplain.

About 50 members of the Salem and Lawrence posts of the Legion acted as a guard of honor. The Lawrence guard consisted of Romeo King,

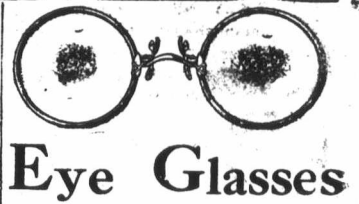
