## MARITIME CASE BASIS AGREED ON

Board of Trade which is studying the question of the readjustment of the economic status of the Maritime Provinces in the Dominion met last week at the Board of Trade and gave careful consideration to the material prepared by W. F. Burditt chairman of the committee, and decided on the patients who object to administration

Mr. Burditt had made an exhaus tive research into the history of the entry of these provinces into Confederation. After going over this mater ial the committee decided that the basis of their claim for consideration at the hands of the Dominio should be the figures quoted by J. D McKenna at Moncton when he produced evidence that, so far from these provinces being indebted to the rest of the Dominion. Canada was deeply in the debt of these provinces

It was felt that the committee has a strong case and could prove that so far from going to the Parliament of Canada as a supliant for alms when they asked for development of Maritime ports and an opportunity to trade on equal terms with manufacturers in Central Canada, they were merely asking the repayment of a just debt.

The committee have sent a reques to Mr. McKenna for copies of his ac dress at the Moncton meeting and will meet again soon to prepare their report for the Charlottetown conference, to be held November 4 and 5.
