The remains of the late Mr. Peter Duffy, who died rather suddenly at Bangor, Maine, on Friday last, the 20th inst., were brought home for interment to Byrne's Road, his native place, by his two brothers on Monday night. Mr. Duffy was well known and respected.

We have received a copy of the P. E. Island Exhibition Prize List, printed by Mr. Coombs for the Exhibition Committee. It is full of information useful to intending exhibitors. The Exhibition will be held on Wednesday and Thursday, the 10th and 11th of October next.

The usual annual picnic of the Benevolent Irish Society will be held on the 8th of August next, and considering that this Society bears the palm for getting up something good and entertaining, we may expect their picnic of this year will be more than up to the standard.

The people of Charlottetown are about to enjoy a rare treat at the hands of Sells & Burns' Refined Irish Soap, to-morrow night, in the Academy of Music. The songs and music, if the report is correct, are of the very best class, and the company itself the finest ever seen in the island.

The Miscoche Tea came off on Thursday evening last. He was straight as a rush to the last. The deceased gentleman occupied many prominent official positions during his life, and when he died was Prebendary of the Island.

SUPERINTENDENT COLEMAN has issued a Time Table for the P. E. Island Railroad, which, though small and portable, is full of useful information, and is an urgent necessity. It gives all the stations in the island, time of departure and arrival of trains, stage and steamer connections with places in the island and Maritime Provinces, and possesses a store of generally useful information bearing on the railway and its connections. The table may appear trifling in itself, its production shows that the spirit of progress is breathing over our island Railroad.

Mr. J. Scott Hutton, principal of the Deaf and Dumb Institution at Halifax is in the city. It appears there are seven Island people in the Institution. Mr. Hutton would like to have it generally known that no one is refused admission to the Institution because of inability to pay, most of our people pay little or nothing. The Island Government give an annual grant of \$200, but it is to the liberality of the outside public the Institution must chiefly look for assistance. There are now 68 people receiving an education there, and it is prepared to receive more.
