Festival of Empire.

Last night in the Board of Trade
Rooms a meeting of the General Com-
mittee of the Festival of Empire was
held, when arrangements were con-
cluded for the shipping of the balance
of the Colony's exhibits. They will be
sent forward by the Mongolian. Let-
ters were read from Mr. J. Outer-
bridge, now in London, in which he
says that good work is being done in
the Newfoundland building and it will
be completed shortly. Many ladies
and gentlemen were actively engaged
forwarding the interests of this coun-
try and intend having Newfoundland
make a creditable showing in the
great pageant. The matter of exhibit-
ing the Brigade pictures from which
in some way the C. C. C. was omitted,
has not yet been definitely decided
upon, but it is possible another and
correct film will be got and that the
pictures will be shown. After dis-
cussing some other matters the meet-
ing adjourned.

A Fire Alarm.

At 8.15 an alarm of fire was turn-
ed in from special box 229 in St.
Michael's Convent, Belvedere, bring-
ing the Central and Eastern firemen
to the scene. Sparks coming from
the chimney in the Convent caused
the alarm. No damage was done and
the firemen's services were not re-
quired. The roads leading to the
Convent being blocked with snow, the
firemen had great difficulty to get
their apparatus along. The roads
should be shovelled or cleaned up, for
if an outbreak of fire occurs in the
suburbs it will be impossible under
present conditions for the fire fighters
to get to the scene promptly and prop-
erty and human life may be jeopar-
dized.

ANOTHER FAMILY FEUD IN KEN-
TUCKY.
Lexington, Ky., April 11.—The call
to arms has been sounded through
Bloody Breathitt County, and the feud
clans are gathering along Trouble-
some Creek near the Perry County
line. Two are dead as the result of
the fighting so far. They are James
Deaton and his brother-in-law Luke
Begley who died to-day from his
wounds. Both were shot by "Devil
Anse" White who was himself badly
wounded, although from his barricad-
ed cabin he is directing his clan
against the hostile Deatons.

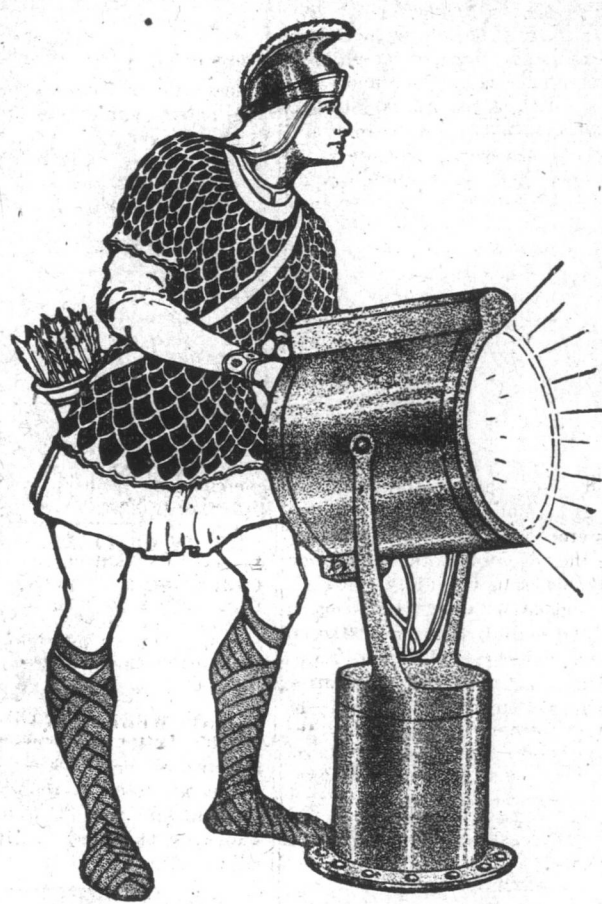

be of 15 inch diameter and fifty cal-
bre.
