

Rt. Rev. Monsignor Roche pres at the R. C. Cathedral at Vespers last night, taking his text from St. Luke. chap 7, 11-16 verse, "The raising to life of the son of the widow of Nain. And when Jesus saw her He had compassion on her and said unto her: weep not, and He came and touched the bier and they that carried him stood still; and He said: "Young man say unto thee arise. And he that was dead sat up and began to speak, and He delivered him to his mother.' The rev. preacher adapted the text to the duties of mothers to their children, and delivered one of the most instructive and practical srmons heard in the Cathedral for a long time. The responsibility of the early training of the children rests almost entirely with. the mother. The children learn to lisp their prayers at her knees, and the mother's teaching and example influences the lives of the children ever afterwards. On the father rests the duty of providing food, clothing and the means to support the family; such a duty keeps him away from home most of the day, it is therefore the
