The 20th Anniversary Parade of C.L.B. Here and There.

LARGEST ON RECORD.
 The Avalon Battalion C. L. B. paraded from their Armoury, Harvey Road, at 2.30 yesterday afternoon for the purpose of attending Divine service at St. Mary's Church. At 2.30 the roll was called and the total strength of the parade was 511, the largest parade that the C. L. B. has ever had in this Colony. Headed by Lieut.-Col. Rendell and the full brass band the parade marched down Long's Hill, Theatre Hill, along New Gower Street, down Job's Lane and Water Street, across the Long Bridge to St. Mary's Church. The parade was led by the members of the Brigade. The ex-members of the Brigade are to be highly congratulated on their turnout, the total strength of the parade members being 190. They were formed in three companies before leaving the hall. The smartness of the ex-members on parade yesterday goes to show that they have not forgotten their turns and the style of marching, although it is a long time since some of them had any practice in the different movements. The church was packed and the new extension was filled with people. The service was conducted by the Rev. H. Uphill assisted by Rev. Canon White, Rev. Canon Temple and Rev. Canon Bolt. The lesson was read by Rev. Canon Bolt. Rev. Canon White was the preacher. His text was the 3rd chapter of Revelation of St. John the Divine and part of the 8th verse—"Behold I have set before thee an open door and no man can shut it. The rev. gentleman spoke on the 20th anniversary of the C. L. B. and the good work it was doing for this Colony and for this city alone and other parts of the world. He was also very pleased to see such a large turnout of ex-members. After the service the Brigade formed up, and leaving the church they proceeded down Water Street, up McBride's Hill, along Duckworth Street, up Cochrane St., Military Road and Harvey Road to the Armoury. The parade was addressed by the battalion before dismissing them. He was very pleased to see such a large number of ex-members, and he congratulated them on their splendid appearance. He also read a letter from Lieut.-Col. Green of the Catholic Cadet Corps, congratulating the C. L. B. on their 20th anniversary and wished them every success in the future. Three hearty cheers were then given for the C. C. C. Lieut.-Col. Rendell then announced that the Secretary of the ex-members' collecting fund, Mr. T. Hallett, received \$100 as a donation towards the Brigade. The Secretary has no idea who sent it, but thanked the kind friend very much. Three cheers were then given for the ex-members by the present. The programme for the week was then read and is as follows: To-night there will be a torchlight parade through the city, starting at 9.15 Tuesday night a concert and dance and Thursday night a banquet. The band under Capt. Snow rendered excellent music along the route.
