### Grand Patriotic Concert At Grand Falls.

#### BELGIAN RELIEF FUND.

A concert was produced in the Town Hall at Grand Falls, on Thursday, December 3rd, that for the scope of its programme and the excellence of its execution has not been equalled in the history of this progressive inland town.

The programme was based on the Concert recently held in St. John's, and in its main points was practically identical. The community here are certainly indebted to the kindness of many in St. John's in lending costumes, etc., which helped in a great measure towards an unprecedented and highly gratifying result.

The greatest praise and gratitude, however, should undoubtedly go to the many here who devoted a large amount of time and infinite pains to such a noble and unselfish object. Mrs. L. R. Cooper with untiring zeal and admirable taste arranged the various numbers, and is mainly responsible for the magnificent effects of the choruses and splendid tableaux, and has beyond a doubt shown a master hand guided by a master mind.

The heartiest co-operation of the participants helped in a very great measure, and made easy what had at first seemed to be a task of no small difficulty, and by the interest and enthusiasm manifested by them amply endorsed the selections of the organizer.

A very pleasing surprise was presented in a solo sung by Mr. A. E. Harris, of Bishop's Falls, with a chorus by a bevy of eight soldier lasses, which was very well received, and proved a delightful addition to the programme.

The costumes of the representative nations were very pretty, as also were the Colonies, while the soldiers and sailors also looked quite a la mode.

The orchestra were composed of Messrs. D. Arklie, F. Hopson, W. Simpson, and D. A. O'Flynn, violins; Prof. D. A. O'Flynn and Mrs. Little, piano; Mr. Brewer, cornet; while Mr. R. Allen conducted the choruses.

The audience was the largest that ever attended such an event here, and the proceeds amounted to about \$210, which will be devoted to the Belgian Relief Fund.

### Death of Mr. G. Burry.

Glovertown has been plunged into grief at the unexpected death of one of its most prominent and most popular citizens, in the person of Mr. Geo. Burry, son of the late Levi Burry (the deceased brother of Mr. Elijah Burry, the well known merchant of Glovertown). The subject of this letter was of a kind, gentle and sunny disposition, which won for him the love and respect of the entire community. He was rich in the possession of the sweetest of all gifts, charity, always ready to help the needy, in whose grateful memories he will linger for a long while. He was keenly interested in all things which tended to uplift humanity, and his place in church and educational matters will be hard to fill. His funeral was the largest in the history of Glovertown. The Orange Society attended in force. At the Methodist Church the service was held which was very impressive. The sermon was based on 1 Sam. chap. 20, verse 18. Many tearful eyes were seen as the clergyman referred to the very acceptable way the deceased had filled his place (1) in the home, (2) in the church, (3) in the world. "We all occupy these places in life and we fill them acceptably or unacceptably." After the service we wended our way to the new made grave where the simple and beautiful ritual of the Methodist Church was read, after which the Orange Society performed the last rites of their society. There we left him sleeping till the final Trump shall sound, when the dead in Christ will rise to die no more. The deceased leaves a wife and two children, two brothers in Glovertown (Capt. B. Burry and Mr. Nelson Burry), two in Vancouver, and two sisters. To the grief stricken relatives we extend our sincerest sympathy.

**SAYS MIKADO OPENING HIS DIET.** Tokyo, Dec. 7.—The opening of the Diet to-day was a brilliant function. Emperor Yoshihito's address dealt in part with the war and requested the Diet to pass the legislation requested by the Government.

"I am happy to announce," the Emperor said, "that the friendship of the Empire, with treaty Powers, is growing in cordiality and that the alliance with Great Britain and the Entente has been cemented in the present critical stage by stronger bonds of amity.

"Our army and navy have crushed the enemy in co-operation with our ally and peace in the Orient is gradually being restored. But the great war is not yet ended. We rely on the loyalty and bravery of our subjects. We wish to attain the object as quickly as possible."
