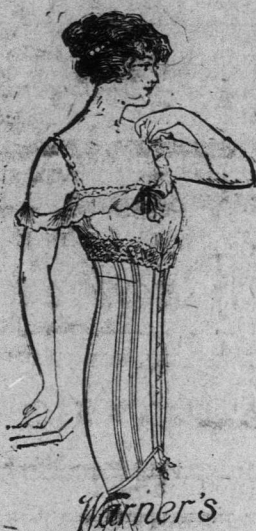

The Price of Peace.

"Your health, madame, is worth more than it can possibly cost you," Samuel Johnson once assured a feminine seeker after advice. I often think of that sentence in relation to many other things besides health. I was calling on a family the other day when the man of the house came home from his work unexpectedly early. He is a big, enthusiastic boy, the delighted father of two smaller but no more joyous boys. After greeting us, he bounded up the stairs to the playroom to see them and the three at once engaged in the most energetic and satisfying romp I ever heard. The wife, who is a nervous, fussy little woman, called out several rather irritable protests to which he responded with surprising good temper. Finally there was an unusually loud crash and she hurried up stairs to see what the trouble was. In the enthusiasm of a new and delightful game invented to celebrate the occasion one of the boys' new toys had been broken. That was too much for their mother. She threw aside all attempts at self restraint and reproached him with open irritation for the breakage. "Aunt Maria gave them that for Christmas and they haven't had it a month yet. How could you?" She always thought the boys were careless, and now what will she think?"

An Afternoon Spoiled.

The boys looked frightened. The husband stood like a naughty child trying to fit the pieces of the broken toy together. The wonderful light which had sparkled in his eyes as he bounded up the stairs had died out. His voice had lost the note of happiness that made it so touchingly boyish, as he answered dully that he

guessed he could mend it. "You know very well you can't," she snapped. We came downstairs, but the romp did not go on. How could it when she had taken the heart out of it? Of course it was too bad to break the expensive toy, but was "what would Aunt Maria think?" worth the spoiling of that hour of special comradeship between father and sons? Is there not many a time in every life when the peace and sunshine of home is worth more than the price of controlled temper, of subjugated nerves, of silenced recrimination or suppressed protest that we are called upon to pay for it?

Possible to Pay Too Big a Price for Peace.

I started to say in paraphrase of Dr. Johnson that the atmosphere of peace and sunshine in the home is worth more than it can cost, but I stopped because I do not quite believe that. When home harmony must be bought by the sacrifice of one's spiritual self, by the relinquishment of one's heart and soul beliefs; or when it means the injustice of entire submission by one party to the uncontrolled selfishness of the other and the consequent growth of that selfishness, it is scarcely worth the price. Nevertheless, even in such cases I do not think that there should be hourly fretful protests, but only a few fervid demands for justice.

These may perhaps leave some impression, whereas the fretful protest becomes as much a habit of the ears that hear it as the tongue that utters it, and only destroys peace and harmony without being of any avail.

U.S. Immigration Bill Vetoed.

President Wilson Would not Stand for Illiteracy Test.

(Canadian Press Despatch).

Washington, Jan. 28.—President Wilson vetoed the immigration bill today because of the literacy test for admission of aliens. His message was received in the house, and referred to the immigration committee, whose chairman, Rep. Burnett, will move next Thursday that the measure be passed over the Executive Veto.

Much informal discussion among members of the House followed the reception of the veto, and while advocates of the bill expressed confidence, other members asserted that the required two-thirds majority to force the measure into law, over the head of the chief executive, could not be procured.

Three times has an immigration containing a restrictive literacy test been vetoed, first by President Cleveland, next by President Taft, and now by President Wilson. Twice congress failed to over-ride the Presidential disapproval, and to-day House managers were insistent that the veto should not be considered until there had been time for reflection.

The president, in his message, frankly told the house, which originated the bill, that he had no pride of opinion on the question, and was not "foolish enough to profess to know the wishes and ideals of America better than the body of her chosen representatives know them."

"If the people of this country have made up their minds to limit the number of immigrants by arbitrary tests, and so reverse the policy of all the generations of Americans that have gone before them, it is their right to do so," he said. "I am their servant, and have no license to stand in their way. But I do not believe that they have."

Owing to the generosity of Mr. Kieley, Mr. W. D. Reid, Mr. Withers and other friends we were enabled to keep the Matinee expenses down to \$79.72 (including \$22.70 which was paid for the miniature flags sold in the audience at a profit).

We very warmly thank the mothers of the little performers for the charming way in which they carried out the costumes, sparing no trouble or expense.

Thanks to His Excellency the Governor, we obtained the addresses of the Volunteers' wives, and through the books of H. M. S. Calypso, those of the Naval Reservists. To each a letter was sent (enclosing stamped envelope for reply) requesting information as to the ages and sex of her children. On receipt of replies (all but one having answered) a list of the addresses and children's names was handed to Mr. James Ayre, of Messrs. Ayre & Sons, Ltd., who most generously undertook to supply at reduced rates, pack (free of charge) and despatch the parcels containing toys for every child mentioned—283 altogether.

With each parcel a stamped addressed postcard with printed form of acknowledgment thereon was sent, requiring only to be signed and posted by the recipient.

Many of the mothers added touching words of gratitude in addition to their signature.

All expenses being paid, we have much pleasure in forwarding a small balance to the Patriotic Fund.

War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 a. m.

REBELS SURRENDER.

LONDON, Feb. 4.

The French Government reports German attacks repulsed at various points.

The Germans sent fireboats down the River Avere, north of Albert, which were stopped by the French before they exploded.

The Russian Government reports very heavy fighting on the left bank of the Vistula and the Carpathians.

The Egyptian Government reports an engagement with a Turkish force, who were allowed to bring bridging material to the Suez Canal bank, unmolested. They were then attacked and died, leaving the bridging material in our hands. Their casualties were sixteen killed and wounded, and forty captured. Our casualties were three wounded.

Bezenhoudt, Kemp, Prophet Van Rensburg and a Rebel Commando of over six hundred have surrendered in South Africa.

HARCOURT.

BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

LONDON, Feb. 4.

Premier Asquith presented a resolution to the Commons to-day, to devote the present session entirely to Government measures. There is no precedent for this Resolution, said the Premier, but all our energies, as a nation, are concentrated on this war and every interest must be subordinated to this over-mastering purpose. Accordingly the Government proposes to take away the opportunity for private members to introduce bills, and will confine its legislative proposals to measures for the prosecution of the war.

Andrew Bonar Law, speaking for the Opposition, agreed to the resolution. He said that the Opposition intended to treat the present sitting of the House as a War Session, as has been done in Canada and in France. In support of his resolution, Premier Asquith said further: "So long as war conditions prevailed, and, until they are determined, and I hope an armistice that at no distant date they will be determined in our favor, we must postpone discussion of the Pure Voting Bill and all domestic legislation in subordination to one nation."
