U.S. Immigration Bill Vetoed.

President Wilson Would not Stand for Illiteracy Test.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Washington, Jan. 28.—President Wilson vetoed the immigration bill today because of the literacy test for ad mission of aliens. His message was received in the house, and referred to the immigration committee, whose chairman, Rep. Burnett, will move next Thursday that the measure be passed over the Executive Veto.

BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

LONDON, Feb. 4. Premier Asquith presented a resotion to the Commons to-day, to de lovernment measures. There is ecedent for this Resolution, said th nation, are concentrated on this war and every interest must be subor dinated to this over-mastering pur pose. Accordingly the Governmen purposes to take away the opportur ity for private members to introduc bills, and will confine its legislative roposals to measures for the pros tion of the war.

Andrew Bonar Law, speaking for the Opposition, agreed to the result tion. He said that the Opposition i tended to treat the present sitting the House as a War Session, as h been done in Canada and in Franc In support of his resolution, Premi Asquith said further: "So long war conditions prevailed, and, unt they are determined, and I hope ar trust that at no distant date they w be determined in our favor,-we m Ostpone discussion of the Plus Voting Bill and all domestic legisl tion in subordination to one nation
