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

"If the arrangement which the United States and Great Britain made

as a guarantee to France during a certain number of years, had been carried out, perhaps the difficulties

facing us to-day would not be so momentous. But, it was never ratified

and consequently the treaty which Great Britain made, to the same effect, never became effective, and

therefore, France to-day is without a
