HEART'S CONTENT, May 20. Monroe candidates opened their meeting to-night in the L.O.A. Hall. Capt. William Legge, the chairman, introduced Mr. Harold Mitchell as one of the trio of Monroe's clean-up party. He was received with enthusiastic applause. He explained the policy of the Monroe party with the ring of sincerity in every word. His condemnation of the Pension Commission and other scandals, was received with applause. The next speaker was Mr. King, well known to the majority of the audience, who spoke as a practical fisherman and whose explanation of the Monroe policy was enthusiastically received. Dr. Tait then followed with a telling speech, reviewing the political situation for the past few years, showing the wasteful expenditure in different departments, and illustrating how two million dollars can be saved without injury to the efficiency of the departments. This also was received with enthusiasm, as was the meeting throughout. The National Anthem and ringing cheers for the Monroe Party brought a most successful meeting of a close.

BONAVIDA SIXTY PER CENT. FOR MONROE.

A private message to a business man in the city was received yesterday, which included the following references to the election campaign:—"Government candidates held a public meeting here last night. Forbes address consisted in introducing the candidates and trying to deny current rumours. Stick tried to introduce himself and read extracts from the Hickman Manifesto. Barnes enlarged on the advantages of the Normal School and tried to put the blame of the country's depression on Monroe's associates. Cheers for the Hickman party were drowned by roasting cheers for Monroe. Bonavida is a sixty per cent. sure for Monroe."

TWILLINGATE DISGUSTED WITH ANNUAL ELECTIONS.

TWILLINGATE, May 20. The Hickman-Coaker trio held a meeting here last night. There was a small attendance compared with other years. Absence of many old supporters was conspicuous. The chairman of the F.P.U. council was also absent and council members were not enthusiastic. Speeches were short and empty. Ashbourne dwelt chiefly on the price of fish etc. Grimes blamed the Opposition members for his appearance before the electors at this time, and also blamed some of the late Opposition members for high cost of Road de Luxe. And other public expenditures during past years. Brown posed as the workman's friend but forgot to assure the workmen that he was drawing a salary of three thousand dollars a year for receiving and answering a few letters and telegrams. He didn't even state that men were returning from the Humber daily, their jobs being filled by foreigners. He attacked the late Opposition as being the cause of the bust up of the Warren government, referring also to Mr. Monroe as "the fox whiskered leader." Brown's attitude last night is being strongly condemned to-day by his own followers and they well resent it on polling day. No enthusiasm was shown during the address and a very faint cheer at the close of the meeting. After the meeting a few supporters met at the F.P.U. hall and managed to organize a small working committee. Only two council members of North Island were present, a member of the Road Board and the Janitor. Electors are disgusted with annual elections and are determined to stop it. Monroe's manifesto well taken here and every district should support his party for a thorough "clean up, keep clean and square deal for all."

He had sat down to some nice salmon, and was just about to run over the scales, when a knock sounded at the door.

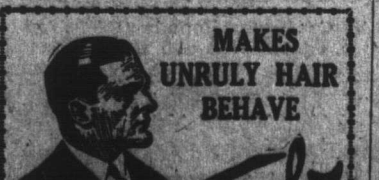
